

### AUTOISTS FAIL TO OBSERVE BUS LOADING ZONES

With violators of the ordinance providing for bus loading zones in the downtown area being "tagged" by the wholesale yesterday and today and pouring into the police court to tell their troubles and offer their alibis to Judge Poulson, it was evident today that some adjustments must be made before the ordinance can be successfully enforced.

Pointing out that the painted curb strips for the buses have not been designated as "no parking" zones, that the parking lines on the pavement have not yet been removed, and that the "one hour" parking signs still stand before the loading zones, all of which offer possible excuses for offenders, Judge Poulson was today following a policy of reprimanding violators and advising them to go forth and sin no more.

The police are continuing their "tagging" activities, and are preparing to close down on the bus drivers who do not draw their vehicles close in to the curbs and out of the traffic. 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### OLD SKETCHES SHOWN IN PARIS

Paris (AP)—Three centuries of opera costumes and scenery are being shown at the Paris Opera. Miniature stage settings by eminent artists, made in the days when they were little known, are grouped now in the museum and library of the National Academy of Music and Dance as the government opera is called.

A portrait of the composer Wagner, made ten years after his death by the great French painter, Renoir, is among the treasures of the exhibition.

Sketches of costumes for many operas, long buried in the archives, have been dusted off and records searched to determine exactly who made them. There are scores of works, signed and unsigned by Boucher, Hocquet, Bernin, Cozzari, Hubert, Robert, and many others, some of whom have been forgotten in the art world.
