Gives Remedy For Pyorrhea To Dentistry



Manhattan, Kas. (AP)—A 21-year search for a pyorrhea cure is nearing an end, says Dr. N. L. Roberts, Manhattan dental surgeon, with success in sight. Dr. Roberts will soon present to the profession a formula which he says will conquer the disease. He attacked the problem in 1906, but only recently has he progressed sufficiently in his laboratory research to offer his claims to his colleagues and permit his formula to undergo the rigorous tests of scientists. Dr. Roberts has announced that he will give the results of his labors to the profession as his contribution to the scientific side of dental surgery.
