LARGE PAINTINGS DECLINE IN FLATS

London (AP)—Large pictures are no longer in demand chiefly on account of the increasing popularity of small houses and flats.

This was illustrated at a Christie sale when Sir Frank Dicksee's Royal Academy picture "Evangeline" was sold six years ago for 237 pounds, was auctioned for 73 pounds.

The painting is six feet, four inches by four feet five inches and was painted when Sir Frank, president of the Royal Academy, was 26 years old, and was the academy success of 1879. Another of Sir Frank's works "Two Crowns" brought 2,000 pounds in 1900 when it was purchased for the Tate galleries.

Art critics declare that if "Evangeline" had been a half or a quarter of its size it would have sold for a great deal more.

The art critics here say that taste in art changes every 25 years or so and that when a particular style is out of fashion both the good and the bad of that style suffer equally. Another factor is the generally low prices for all kinds of contemporary pictures. Large pictures of any kind are now difficult to dispose of because few persons have wall space on which to hang them.

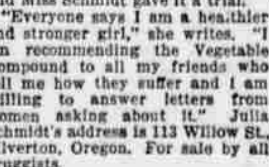
