YOUTHFUL ORGY LAYS WASTE TO SOVIET EXHIBIT

Brussels, Belgium, Jan. 13. (AP)—What was once a soviet exhibition today was a heap of debris after an orgy of destruction staged by nationalist youths.

The eruption of more than 50 turbulent youths dumbfounded the guests gathered for the opening of the exhibit organized by the Belgo-Russian league of international relations. The invaders were armed with cudgels.

The leader of the band blew a whistle. At this signal the party divided, some to interfere with the exhibit staff from preventing or calling aid while the others set to work to smash everything.

The bust of Lenin was dashed to the floor and splintered and the busts of other prominent communists were similarly treated. Contents of the shelves were swept to the floor. Pictures were slashed and furniture destroyed. The band went from room to room thoroughly carrying out their work of demolition.

The raiders said they belonged to the league of nationalist youth and the action was a protest against "lies which are spreading a false idea of the present Russia and a revolting picture of czarist Russia."

Their work of destruction completed and at a given signal by the leader, the nationalist, flushed, but exultant, reformed in ranks. They marched out distributing leaflets and shouting: "Down with soviet Russia."

RECOVERS FROM PNEUMONIA
Turner, Jan. 13.—Billy Hook, young son of Mr. and Mrs. R. H. Hook, who reside on a farm east of Turner, is nicely improving and was able to be removed to his home on Tuesday. Billy has been critically ill for over a week with pneumonia and complications. He passed through the crisis last Friday night, and has been on the rapid road to recovery since. The lad was so ill for several days that grave fears were felt for his recovery.

Knights Of Road Unwelcome Visit Displeases Town

Turner, Jan. 13.—The peace-abiding citizens of Turner have been disturbed by two hobo's in the last week. Both of them tarried for a day or two before deciding to move on.

From all appearances they were from the feeble-minded school, or the cottage farm, but upon investigation none of the inmates seemed to have escaped. They begged for food at several prominent Turner homes.

Monday afternoon one of the invaders appeared in town, and after spending the evening until a late hour at the Ball Brothers garage, quietly sneaked out into the night. At midnight Lee Barber, of the Barber grocery and meat market was awakened by what sounded like some one trying to remove the screen from a window. Investigation revealed the hobo was gathering trash and boards to start a fire with. After starting a fire across the street from the Barber residence on Main street, the mysterious tramp laid down on the ground beside the fire and slept. Barber stood at the window and watched the fire until it burned out at 2:15 o'clock. The traveler awoke, got up and walked to the Southern Pacific depot where he pleasantly spent the remainder of the early morning hours.

Next day he was about the streets until late afternoon, when he took refuge down the railroad tracks hoping for a warmer reception at his next stopping place.

TRAIN DOCTORS AS SEA SPECIALISTS

Berlin (AP)—Ship's doctors of the Hamburg America Line, who until now as on all German liners were only transitively attached to the service, will in future be permanently appointed. The object of this innovation is to train a staff of physicians as competent specialists for the ocean service.

Special leaves of absence will be granted to enable each doctor to perfect his studies and training on shore. This arrangement is expected to rebound to the benefit of the physician, the shipping company as well as the passengers, assuring the latter of finding more competent medical advisers on board than heretofore. Concomitantly with this alteration, the surgical and hospital equipment of each vessel is to be enlarged and brought up to the most up-to-date standard.

SUPER FILMS OF PAST FADE OUT BEFORE BEN HUR

"Ben Hur" showing at the Elsinore, has proved beyond a reasonable doubt that the ultimate, as concerns the motion picture, has not been reached.

That statement is not press-agent stuff. The declaration is made adverbially. The management wishes to explain that, in effect, this is what has been said by many hundreds already. Their laudation was not solicited; it was voluntary. The gist of their remarks—and there was not one unfavorable to the picture—was this:

"D. W. Griffith has done some wonderful things with the photoplay. For instance when he offered us 'The Birth of a Nation,' we concluded that the zenith had been approached. Subsequently there appeared 'Intolerance.' Then we knew no more could be done. Since then there have been a score of real successes. 'Quo Vadis' among them, and we were greatly impressed."

"But that is not the point. 'In our opinion there never has been a photoplay which has rivaled 'Ben Hur.' It stands alone. O. Henry once said, 'If I were to live a thousand years I might come close enough to touch the hem of her garment.'"

"But Ben Hur, with Ramon Novarro as the lead, has approximated what—to plagiarize—Don Marquis has said is the 'nearly perfect photoplay.'"

Here there shall be no words such as stupendous, awesome, splendid, nor shall there be any figures as to what the producers spent.

25 MILES PER HOUR DANGEROUS SPEED

Paris (AP)—Twenty-five miles an hour has been fixed as a sort of arbitrary "dangerous" automobile speed in downtown Paris. There is no legal limit for the driver of a car is responsible for his acts at all speeds.

The police, nevertheless, have decided that a common sense standard must be used so traffic officers can exercise control.

This limit is to be enforced only where there are cross streets. On the avenues a car may go as fast as traffic conditions and safety permit.

COPS DICTATE GOOD CAFES

Paris (AP)—"Taking one consideration with another," the Paris Police Commissioner's life is decidedly "a happy one," in which he differs from his Gilbertian colleague.

The question he is most frequently asked is where real French cooking can be sampled at moderate cost. His replies are generally so satisfactory that the inquirer often comes back and invites him to dinner.

NEED THREAT TO DISSUADE TAX GRABBER

Earl C. Miller of Portland, who sought to collect delinquent taxes from the county on a commission basis, will not collect such taxes, although Sheriff Bower had to finally advise Miller he would throw him out of the office unless he departed in peace.

Miller put up a proposition to the sheriff and the court to collect on a basis of 10 per cent on the first \$100; 15 per cent on \$25 up to \$100; and 25 per cent under \$25. In addition, he wanted, after he collected \$2500 for the county to pay him \$250, and then \$250 on every \$1250 after that.

In the first instance the court was satisfied that it could not take county money to pay some one commissions for its collection. In addition Marion county is probably in better condition than any other as far as delinquent taxes are concerned and it is understood that the cost of tax collection is virtually covered by interest and penalties on what delinquent taxes there are to collect.

Paris (AP)—"Houses that kill" are slowly being demolished in Paris but there remain yet several score buildings where there are hundreds of bedrooms without ventilation or sunlight.

OXYGEN AIDS LIFE GRIP OF NEW YEAR BABE

Chicago, Jan. 13 (AP)—Baby George Smith, born New Year's day, pronounced dead Wednesday noon, and then revived by oxygen and later strengthened by two blood transfusions, today was given a "long chance for recovery" by attending physicians.

Steady improvement in the child's condition was noted after midnight, when his breathing was deeper and his cries became louder and more frequent. Feeding with a medicine dropper continued regularly and the infant appeared to be improving under the nourishment.

Mrs. Mary Smith, the mother, who submitted twice to blood transfusions and a squad of firemen, who have administered oxygen unceasingly since Wednesday, were the other principals in the drama of life and death.

Last Saturday, the infant who weighed nine and one-half pounds at birth, underwent a minor operation, but failed to improve. About noon Wednesday, he apparently had ceased breathing, and a frantic call to the fire department brought men to the house with regulation fire-fighting equipment.

The pediatric squad remained and worked over the tiny form for 25 hours. Then came the first faint cry. Baby George's eyelids flickered. His tiny hand tightened around the fingers of an attending fireman and the squad grinned its happiness.

SHELL FISH TRAP RATS OF DONEGAL

Donegal, Ireland (AP)—If the Pied Piper of Hamelin could only come to Donegal! He'd make a good war correspondent in the battle raging here between the lumps and the rats.

Thus far the lumps have had by far the better of it, thousands of rats having fallen in the unequal struggle, to the great joy of all Donegalites.

A limpet, for the benefit of those who have not taken a degree in

zoology, is a small edible shell-fish which sticks close to a rock.

The armies of rats which infest the islands on the northwest coast off Donegal have been adventuring to the waterside in quest of food.

When the tide recedes, the rats insert their noses between the partly raised shell of the limpet, hoping to make a meal of the edible fish. But the limpet is a wise bird—or fish. Exceedingly sensitive to the slightest touch, he—she or it—instantly closes on its prey with a vice-like grip.

The rat is held tight. He stays put until the relentless encroachment of rising waters claims him.

DEMOLISH HAUNTED CASTLE OF SCOTS

Aberdeen, Scotland (AP)—Slains Castle, lashed at its base for centuries by roaring waves which in their time have kept such notables as Samuel Johnson awake all night, is being demolished.

It became too old and spooky for any earthly use. The last items of furniture, oak beams and the like were sold at auction some time ago.

For centuries Slains Castle, built sheer on the cliffs jutting above Erulan Bay, was the seat of the Earls of Erroll, lord high constables of Scotland. In 1916 the estate was sold to Sir John Ellerman, ship owner, who disposed of it in 1923 because of what he considered exorbitant taxation, and it has been empty ever since.
