

TILDEN MAKES YOUNG STARS SUGGESTIONS

Chicago, Feb. 13.—(AP)—The plan of William T. Tilden to give America's young tennis stars a fair chance in the coming campaign to bring the Davis cup back to this country was before the annual convention of the United States Lawn Tennis association Saturday.

Two sets of Davis cup players are suggested in Tilden's plan, one to compete in the American zone play, under the recent decision of the U. S. L. T. A. and the other to sail for Europe early in the summer in order to get accustomed to foreign conditions for the finals in France. "To send the United States team over in June for the cup matches in July," Tilden said, "only would court certain defeat. Above all, develop the younger stars by sending over at least two juniors to gain experience in international play, whether or not they compete for the Davis cup."

"Francis Hunter and I found last year that training conditions in Europe are entirely different than in America and we have been competing for at least six weeks before we reached top form."

Tilden's plan is to have George Lott, John Hennessey and other young stars carry the burden of the American competition, while he and Hunter are getting accustomed in France, in that way he and Hunter, with the assistance of some of the younger players, may be able to lift the cup from France. He and Hunter also are willing to compete in the American zone while Lott, Hennessey and others are sent abroad to get in condition.

Tilden opened his 1928 campaign last night with a victory over Lott which showed the brilliant service of the Tilden of old. Lott could do virtually nothing with Tilden's cannonball services.

WARNING HEARD FROM WEALTHY DOME WITNESS

New York, Feb. 13.—(AP)—John D. Rockefeller, Jr., back from Washington where he testified in the senate's Teapot Dome investigation, warned of "sharp" business practices in a talk over the radio. He did not mention the oil inquiry.

Mr. Rockefeller, whose talk was broadcast by station WJZ listed integrity, obedience to law, clean living and loyalty as the four fundamental qualities underlying character.

"Is there any of them than can be omitted or ignored without hazardous continued business success?" he asked. "It is true that money is often made by tricky and sharp practice, but successful business is not established on a foundation so shifting."

"Regrettably must we admit," he said, "that instances are not lacking of corporations and individuals who set themselves up as superior to law. But when condemned as they are soon to be in the court of public opinion, even the most worldly minded is bound to ask himself 'does it pay?' and to admit that no business can be permanently successful which is not law abiding."

He touched on violation of the customs laws by the rich and disregard of the 18th amendment by those who felt it an infringement.

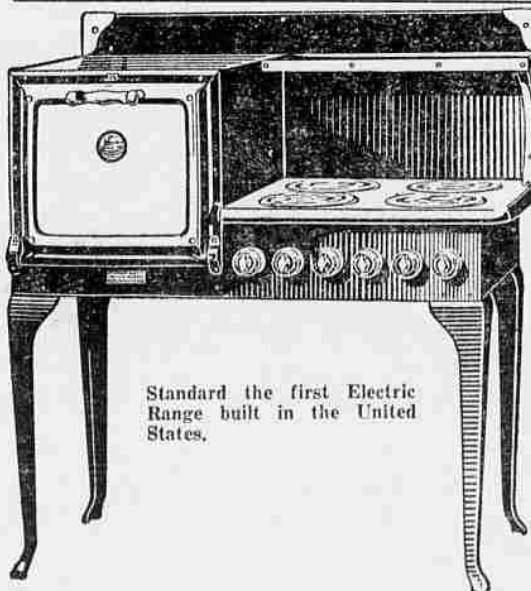
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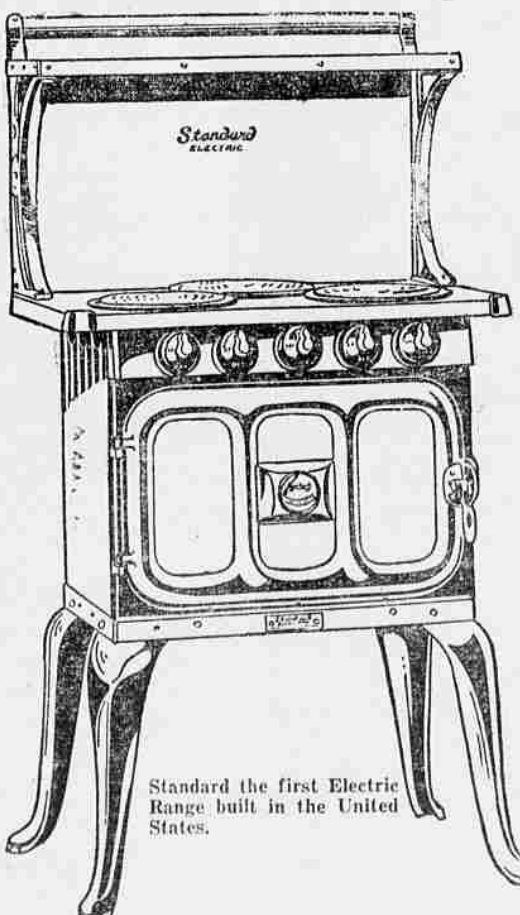
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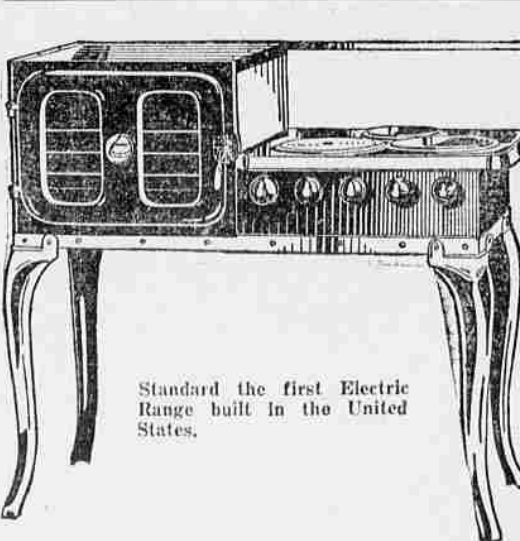
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
