

RACHEL BRIERY FUNERAL RITES FROM WOODBURN

Woodburn, March 13.—Funeral services were held at the Methodist Episcopal church yesterday afternoon for Mrs. Rachel Elsie Briery, who died at her home in this city Saturday, March 10, at the age of 59 years. The service was presided over by Rev. Aaron Neufeld and prayer was offered by Robert Witty. Music was by Mrs. Aaron Neufeld and Mrs. Vern D. Bain, with Miss Wilma Morrison at the piano.

Interment was in Belle Passi cemetery. Rachel Elsie Gortuch was born in Brownstown, Iowa, January 19, 1878, and resided there until 1895 when she moved to Kansas. She was married to P. W. Briery at Downs, Kansas on November 15, 1905. To this union were born five children, two dying in infancy and one daughter, Beryl, at the age of five.

The family came west to California in 1920 and from there to Oregon in 1928, and have made their home in Woodburn for the past two years. Surviving the deceased are her husband, P. W. Briery, a son, Ralph, and a daughter, Ruth. She also leaves one brother, Ralph Gortuch.
