Mrs. Lillian Mabel Lant, wife of J. Henry Lant, 156 North Front street, died in a local hospital late Thursday. Mrs. Lant who was born in Illinois 64 years ago, had suffered with diabetes for the last half year but was seriously ill only two days. Her husband, four sons, one daughter, 12 grandchildren, two sisters and three brothers, survive her. One son, Russell Lant, and her daughter, Mrs. Mabel Ross, live in Salem. One son lives in Seattle, two sons in California, and her brothers and sisters in the east. The Lants came to Salem from Kansas eight years ago. She was a member of the Methodist church in Kansas but had never transferred her membership here. Funeral services will be held at Clough Houston chapel at 3 o'clock Saturday afternoon.

A lien case, Field vs. Gaskell et al., was heard before Judge L. H. McMahon in circuit court Friday afternoon.

Plans for the entertainment of Lions clubs of the state which will hold their annual convention here next month were discussed by the Salem Lion Friday noon. J. E. Fitzgerald, general chairman, announced that around 400 are expected for the club luncheon of convention week. Dr. W. B. Mott, chairman of the golf tournament, reports that the play will be a nine links of the Ill-liee country club or the Oak Knoll course. Merchants of the city will be asked to make a special effort to decorate with the club emblem.

A cash contribution of 25 cents each, upon suggestion of the international headquarters, was made to help defray the international radio program for the blind people of the United States, April 28, with nationally known artists taking part. The actual cost of the program will be in excess of \$12,000. Efforts will be made by the club to have every blind person in the district hear the program and those not having radios of their own will be invited to homes where the artists may be heard. The state blind school is making special preparations for the program and is inviting all blind people to come to the school for the occasion. The program for the coast will be broadcast over the Pacific coast network.

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Bunce is seeking damages amounting to \$1162 in an action filed in circuit court for injuries alleged to have been sustained by his jaw from C. Eldridge in doing dental work for Bunce. In fact, Bunce alleges, that Eldridge cracked his jaw bone in trying to make a bridge fit.

Bunce alleges that Eldridge agreed to do some bridge work for him and guaranteed a fit or his money would be returned. He states that the bridge work was done and in a few days he returned and told Eldridge that the bridge didn't fit. An X-ray examination was then made and Eldridge, he asserts, in undertaking to fix the plaintiff's mouth used some kind of an instrument on the jawbone with which he not only bruised the flesh, he charges, but tore the muscles and cracked the jawbone. He seeks \$1162 in special damages and \$1000 in general damages.

In this connection the supreme court this morning issued a formal statement correcting press telegrams to the effect that the court was acting officially in the matter, as follows:

"The members of the supreme court state that they have never authorized a statement that they would recommend to the governor that the sentence of Kelley and Willos be commuted to imprisonment for life. On the contrary, upon application made by Mr. Ewers, the attorney for the convicted parties, the court expressly declined to sign any recommendation in the premises, deeming that the duties of the court ended when it denied the writ of habeas corpus and as members of the court they had no further concern in the matter."

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District Attorney Carson will arrange for a formal commission to examine Haberly before taking any other action in the case.

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
