

# SENATORS BEAT COTTAGE GROVE 10 to 4

Cottage Grove, Or., May 21—By defeating Cottage Grove 10 to 4 here yesterday, the Salem Senators baseball club went into undisputed leadership of the Willamette Valley League, being now the only undefeated club. Bend, which up to yesterday was undefeated, forfeited a game to Albany as the result of a row with the umpire.

The local club threw a real scare into Salem by leading in the game here 2 to 1 until the fifth inning. Glenn Keber, Salem second baseman, knocked a home run in the fifth to tie the score. This mighty blow put new spirit into the Senators and they collected six runs in the sixth and two more in the ninth.

Johnny Beck pitched his usual masterful game holding the Cottage Grove boys to scattered hits. Cottage Grove's two stellar hitters, Hill, first baseman, and Sells, right fielder, were the only batters to make their blows count.

Albany, Ore., May 21—With the aid of an unflinching umpire and two deputy sheriffs, Red Rupert's Albany Aces achieved the impossible yesterday afternoon by defeating the mighty Bend baseball club 6 to 0. Al Sanders declared the league game forfeited to Albany in the seventh inning when Bend argued too long over a disputed decision. Albany at the time led 2 to 1.

The dispute arose when Jenks, Albany player, stood three and two with two out. The sixth ball was called a strike, but Eubanks, Bend receiver missed it. Jenks went to first and Patterson, a man on base, came home. Bend declared Jenks attempted to bunt. Murphy, Bend hurler, protested so violently that deputy sheriffs took him from the field. Finally Umpire Al Sanders ordered the game forfeited to Albany.

Eugene defeated Wendling at Wendling Sunday afternoon 6 to 5 in a tight game.

## SALEM SPIKERS PLACE SECOND AT PACIFIC U.

For the second consecutive year at the Forest Grove invitational track meet under auspices of Pacific university, Corvallis high school won first and Salem high took second. Corvallis collected 40 points, seven more than Salem.

Coach Louis Anderson's trackers set two new marks for the meet when Blaco clocked off the 440 yard dash in 52.1, as against the old record of 52.2; and Fred Smith tossed out the javelin 150 feet 11 inches to beat the old mark of 154 feet. In addition to these two firsts, Salem won first in the discus throw and tied for first in the pole vault. Homer Smith heaved the discus 105 feet, and Stan Perrine went into the air 10 feet 3 inches.

Johnny Emmett won second in the 880 yard dash, Alfred Downs captured third in the high hurdles; Paul Todd placed fourth in the low hurdles; and Blaco ran in the mile in the 220. The relay team, Siegmund, Blaco, H. Smith and Emmett, won second.

Only one entry from each school was permitted in each of the following events, 100, 220, 440, and high and low hurdles. Two were permitted in the others. This was a disadvantage to Salem which has two or three men of practically equal calibre for each event. Corvallis, with several individual stars, won out.

Among other schools entered were Eugene, Independence, Vancouver, Washougal, Hill Military, Hillsboro, Beaverton, Milwaukie, West Linn, and Forest Grove.

Salem high will hold the annual inter-class track meet on Sweetland field some time this week and probably will hold a dual meet with the O. A. C. Rooks next Saturday here.

## W. U. CAPTURES FOURTH PLACE IN TRACK MEET

With 14 points, Willamette placed fourth in the five-cornered track meet in Portland Saturday. The Oregon frosh won the meet with 60 points, the Oregon Rooks took 50, and Multnomah collected 40. Chemawa Indian school was last with one point. Pacific university was to have been entered in the meet, but withdrew at the last minute.

Willis Hathaway of Willamette placed first in the two-mile race with a time of 10:38.8. He easily led the field in this event, his nearest opponent being Johnson of the Rook squad.

The Willamette relay team composed of Tweedie, Gull, French, and Rodgers sprung something of a surprise by winning the 880-yard relay in 3:44.2-5. The freshmen were second, the rooks, third and Multnomah club, fourth.

Van Dyke and McCormick of the Bearcat squad took third and fourth places in the mile; Rodgers was third in the shot put, and second in the first heat of the 220-yard dash.

Rasmussen, of Chemawa, took third in the high jump, for the Indian school's only point.
