Edward Howard, D. D.

B., as subdeacon of the mass. The Rev. Victor Hansen, O. S. B., will deliver the sermon and the choir of St. Luke's church will help to solemnize the occasion by their esteemed services, under the direction of Frank DeBois. 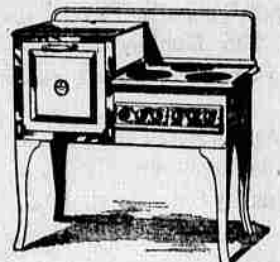
TEACHERS TO LEAVE
