### Silver Creek Falls Plunge Will Be Made July 1 Under Present Plans Of Daredevil

Silverton, June 12.—Al. Fausett has set the date to go over the 194 foot high Silver Creek falls on July 1, about 3 o'clock in the afternoon. The dam has been completed, is about 100 feet above the top of the falls, will back up the water for more than 100 feet, is three feet deep. The canoe, 12 feet long and four feet wide will be just below the dam. This will be opened by a device prepared by one of Fausett's men. The pent-up water will rush him over the 184 foot drop to the solid rock bottom whirlpool below. Near this pool the same men who took him out of the water at the Oregon falls, will swim to him and bring him to shore.
