

I. W. DICKINSON FUNERAL RITES INDEPENDENCE

Independence, June 13—Isaac Worthington Dickinson passed away at his home, 163 D street, June 11, 1928, after a lingering illness.

He was born in Jackson county, Iowa, January 27, 1846. He came to Oregon in 1895 settling near Lebanon, where he lived for one year. He then moved to Independence where he has since made his home. He was engaged in the livery business for 25 years.

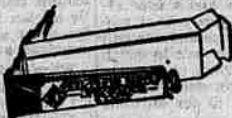
A road program with the Dayton-Salem river road as the initial objective was laid out.
