DR. FRANKLIN TOMAKE TOUR OF FAR EAST

Dr. F. G. Franklin, librarian at Willamette university, will sail from Seattle Sunday morning for a ten weeks tour which will show him the extent as it is seldom seen by the white man. Dr. Franklin will be a member of a party of 45 headed by Dr. J. W. Washington, Hall of Seattle, better known as Upton Close, a writer who is considered an authority on conditions in the Far East and who has spent the greater part of his life in China, Japan and Korea.

From Seattle, Upton Close and his party will go to Japan where they will spend two weeks. Ten days will be spent in and near Shanghai, and two weeks in northern China. They will go far inland in Manchuria and later will go into Korea.

Active travel conveyances will be used almost entirely. Members of the tour were warned that so far as physical inconveniences are concerned they may expect almost anything from sleeping on the deck of the tramp steamer which will take them across the Yellow Sea, to enduring companionship with native Chinese on the train which will carry them to the interior of China.

Last summer Upton Close made the same trip with six University of Washington men.

An attempt will be made throughout the tour to receive a first hand view of actual living conditions among peoples of the orient and not the standardized viewpoint received by ordinary tourists. The party will keep out of the war zone in China.

COOK LOSES OUT ON \$5000 CLAIM FISHER ESTATE

The \$5000 claim of Harold L. Cook against the estate of the late Dr. E. H. Fisher is disallowed and rejected in a judgment handed down from Marion county circuit court by Judge L. H. McMahon.

Cook appealed his case to circuit court after the county court had turned down his claim.

Dr. Fisher died October 27, 1933, and the final hearing on the estate was for and held December 31, 1937, with no objection made. Cook did not present his claim until January 31, 1938, a month after the final hearing.

Cook's claim grew out of a real estate transaction started in March, 1933, when Cook and his sister, Mina M. Cook, who was Dr. Fisher's office nurse, purchased a piece of ground in the Garden city addition of Salem from Eleanor Lundberg for a consideration of \$14,000. Cook made a \$5000 payment and a mortgage for \$9000 was given which according to an agreement was to be paid off by Dr. Fisher in installments of \$1000 as an increased salary for Mina Cook while she remained in his employment. Prior to the payment of the first installment she voluntarily left the employment of Dr. Fisher and the deal involving her brother was called off.

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SCHOOL BOARD SHOWN GRAPHS OF OPERATIONS

Graphs which visualize the activities of the school district during the past eight years were exhibited to the school board in their meeting last night by Superintendent George W. Hug. Development of school work in various new lines and unusual activity in building are shown in the graphs worked out by the superintendent as a means of planning for future activities of the district.

Twelve major activities and developments are listed by the superintendent for the schools during the last eight year period. Salem schools had their first elementary supervisor in 1920-21 and in 1921-22. The supervisor was discontinued for the next year and in 1923-24 Miss Carlotta Crowley was engaged for the position which has continued in an unbroken line since that time.

The department of research, special routes for bused children, was started in 1924-25 with two rooms. The next year there were four rooms and this year five. The part time continuation school is only two years old and the Salem extension center of the University of Oregon, of special value to teachers, has also only a two-year standing on the graphs.

Summer school for grade and junior high pupils dates back to the 1924 mark and the health education program in the schools is two and a half years old. Music supervision has an unbroken line since 1920, the beginning of Superintendent Hug's record on his graphs. Art supervision started in 1920, but after two years there was a four year break in the line. The work was started again two years ago. The physical education program dates from 1923-24, and the special department supervision plan in the junior and senior high schools from 1925-26. Segregation of pupils on the ability basis, was started in 1925-26 in the junior high schools and in the senior high only during the past year.

Building operations are vitrified in the graphs which show that the Klamath school was built in 1930-31. The east wing to the senior high school five years ago, Parish junior high, four years ago, Leslie junior high, a year ago. The old high school gym was remodeled and seven class rooms added to the high school three years ago. Washington school during the past three years ago, the district purchased five new acres for the athletic field in 1933 and the Tumalo park 12 acres two years ago.

United States history, writing, music and drawing examinations were given this morning and physiology, reading, manual training, composition, domestic science, methods in teaching, and arithmetic methods this afternoon.

The men or women who compiled the questions for the United States history apparently had a flare for the pre-revolutionary period. There were two questions in the 13 that covered current events—the political conventions and the Teapot Dome investigation—and all others concerned the time with events prior to the year of 1821. According to Mrs. Patterson this makes a difficult examination for teachers, especially those the Civil War and the growth and development of the United States. One entire question was devoted to Henry's Rebellion.

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MAXWELL TO OPERATE UNTIL COUNCIL ACTS

Charles Maxwell, who, after many weeks of parley in the city council and the planning commission as to whether he has a legal right to operate, has at last opened up his barbers shop in the Hollywood district, will apparently be untroubled at least until after the next council meeting.

The next meeting of the council will have on the calendar for third reading an ordinance providing for the same change which was necessary before Maxwell could operate. Maxwell's supporters will be handicapped by the absence of Alderman Hal D. Patton, as there is some question whether the ordinance will receive the necessary eight votes.

Donald W. Miles, attorney for Maxwell, takes the position that the council's adoption a week ago last Monday night of the planning commission's report recommending the change to some had the effect of changing the zone, and that passage of the ordinance is only for the convenience of the council in keeping the record straight.

Miles advised Maxwell to go ahead and open up his place of business, which Maxwell did. Guy O. Smith, attorney for the citizens who have protested against the operation of a business in that district, said today that he did not think any action would be taken by his clients until after the next meeting.

Should the ordinance pass it is made plain that court action will be taken in the effort to keep Maxwell from operating his business. Should it not pass, and Maxwell continues to operate as his attorney contends he has the right to do, court action doubtless will be taken to stop him, so there is a pretty certain assurance of litigation in any event.

Any formal complaint against Maxwell in the courts will contend that the petition for the zone change was insufficient because of certain names who signed requested that they be withdrawn. Attorney

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
