

SCHOOL BOARD AT SCIO WILL CONSTRUCT GYM

Scio, June 21—Fred Sturges was elected a member of the Scio board of education for a term of one year, at the annual school meeting at the high school building this week.

John Kelly was elected for a term of three years. Kelly had been appointed by the county superintendent to fill out the unexpired term of W. J. Chrony, who resigned some months ago. Wm. Sims, holdover member of the board, succeeds Sturges as chairman.

J. F. Wesley was elected clerk for a term of one year. Wesley has officiated in that capacity many years in the past. He succeeds Mrs. Cora Calahan who had succeeded to the duties of district clerk for a number of years.

Gymnasium bonds amounting to approximately \$1800 are to be paid at the rate of \$500 a year, this year's payment to be made in December, according to action of the board.

The Scio school board has discussed the cleaning up of the school grounds and repairing of the building during school intermission. E. C. Shelton and Prof. Gallagher will look after this feature. It is announced, Shelton has been janitor for a number of years.

A vacancy still exists in the in-

mediate room, although many applications have been filed with the board for this position. The 1928-29 school year will open September 17, according to present plans.
