She states that one unique thing about the English government has established eight schools there—an exceedingly large number of an Indian town of 3000 inhabitants. Miss Holder, who is on a furlough is visiting with her mother in Salem. She expects to return to India soon.

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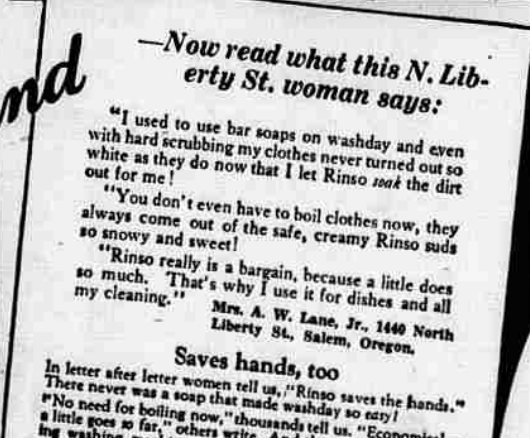
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
