

NORRIS FLAYS BOTH PARTIES IN STATEMENT

Washington, July 13 (AP)—The Farmer-Labor party has chosen a candidate who "does not choose to run."

Senator Norris, republican, Nebraska, selected as the standard bearer of that party, declined the nomination late yesterday, but in a statement accompanying his refusal said that his action was not prompted by satisfaction with the two major political parties, or their platforms.

"For reasons that I have several times publicly expressed: I cannot accept the nomination for president tendered me yesterday in Chicago," he said. "This does not mean that I am not in full sympathy with those who are opposed to the platforms and the presidential nominees of the major political parties."

Senator Norris declared that the present system of choosing a president is "antiquated and illogical" and added that it is a practical impossibility for the people to select anyone who had not first been nominated by one of the dominant political parties. "This system must continue to grow even worse until the people become sufficiently aroused to demand that they have a direct voice and vote in the election of a chief magistrate."

The Nebraska senator devoted only the opening paragraphs of his statement to a discussion of the electoral college, and then referring to electrical power, he declared, "that in this campaign we are confronted with a practical demonstration of the power of monopoly."

CARPENTER GIVEN \$11,276 DAMAGES

Medford, Ore., July 13 (AP)—A jury in the circuit court early today returned a verdict for \$11,276 in favor of R. B. Holloper, in his damage suit against Charles W. Palm. He asked for \$15,300. Holloper, a carpenter, was injured while working on a building belonging to Palm in May, 1926. The case involved the workmen's compensation act. When the construction started Palm filed notice that he rejected the provisions of the act. The industrial commission claimed that he was under its provisions until July 1, 1926, despite the rejection. Judge J. R. Walker of Medford ruled that Holloper was not under the compensation act.

The accident occurred May 15, 1926. The case will be appealed to the state supreme court.

Paris (UP)—Nearly half the 32,000 American army trucks and ambulances left in France are still in service, thanks to the French dealers in automobile parts, who had the foresight to buy up the entire spare-parts depots at the end of the war. The continued performance of these machines has done much to establish the good reputation American trucks now hold in France.

TINY AUTO MAKES DEBUT
London (UP)—A new ultra light automobile with a nine horsepower motor, speed of more than 60 miles an hour and mileage better than 45 miles on a gallon, has been put on the British market. It sells at \$575, the lowest price of any vehicle of its kind in Great Britain. Production will be 300 to 350 cars a week, a large output for a British factory.

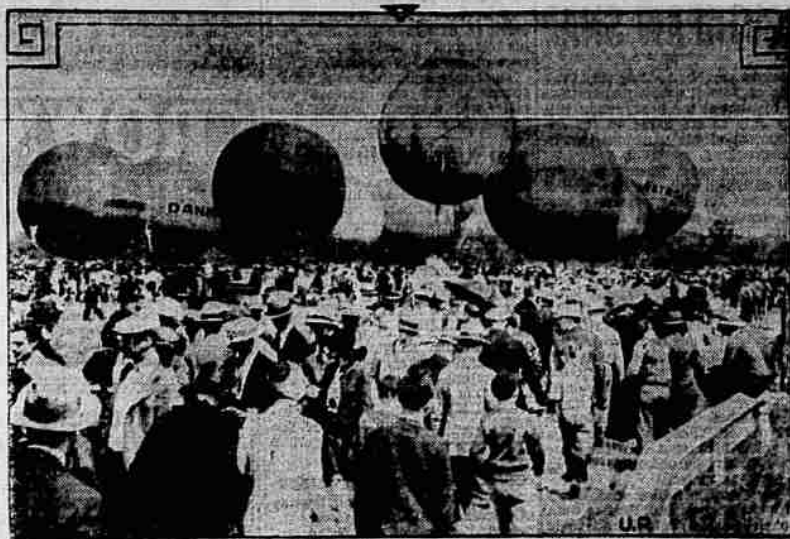

BANDIT CHASE ENDS IN BATTLE WITH 2 KILLED

Eureka, Cal., July 13 (AP)—Four men in an automobile swooped down on the village of Willow Creek today, robbed the Brizard store there and took its safe with them and hurried away.

Four sheriff's deputies from Burnt Ranch gave chase. The officers and bandits met at Sal's creek and opened fire. Charles Carpenter, 40, a deputy, was shot and killed. He leaves a widow and five small children.

One bandit was shot and killed. Companions threw him out of their car and sped on. Another bandit jumped from the car and escaped in the woods.

Poses were hastily organized in Humboldt, Trinity and Shasta counties and led by peace officers were scouring the northwestern section of the state in search of the robbers.

PATRONAGE PROBE DELAYS INQUIRY

Washington, July 13 (AP)—After extensive hearings in the south and a single session in this city, the senate postoffice patronage subcommittee was in recess today, awaiting requested information from Postmaster General New. The nature of which was carefully guarded.

Appearing before the subcommittee at its hearing here, late yesterday, Mr. New declared that every effort had been taken by his department to prevent the sale of postoffice appointments.

LAMBERT CANNING STILL UNFINISHED

Canning of Lambert cherries is expected to continue on into next week and the quality of the later Lamberts going into the cans has been very good, with fewer cracks showing and less sorting required than for the Lamberts which went into the fresh shipping pack earlier in the season.

Roy Hurst states that good returns are being received as to the condition of the cherries on the cars sent out by him to eastern markets on their receipt there and he states that the market has held up well on good cherries and that his growers, he believes, will be well satisfied with the returns.

He states that packing losses because of heavy sorting costs will run about 15 cents a box on the average pack of the Lamberts this year, due to the high percentage of cracked cherries.

If the Smith wetness, and his desire to mar the constitution, are parts of his religion, then he and that much of his religion must take the consequences.

SAILORS TAKEN FROM BARREN OCEAN ISLAND

Cape Town, South Africa (UP)—The little sealing steamer Kildalkey has returned here with 42 persons rescued from a "Robinson Crusoe" existence on the bleak and chill fringes of the Antarctic.

The salvaged group, which includes two women and one child, is the crew of the wrecked sealer Lozere, and was marooned for three weeks.

The Lozere, a French steamer, building with the oil which weeks of ocean hunting had gained it, was preparing to return to Havre when it struck a submerged rock off Kerguelen and broke its back. Broadcasting a call of distress, the captain got his crew to shore and awaited relief.

Owners of the Kildalkey at Cape Town, hearing the distant call for help, hastily provisioned their ship and sent it across the wild wastes of the South Indian ocean to the inhospitable island. Mountainous waves hammered the little 300-ton Kildalkey. Its chief engineer was killed when the sea's violence hurled him down a coal bunker.

Meanwhile the company from the French steamer occupied two huts which previous squatters had built on the island and eked out their ship's stores with sea-fowl and such vegetation as they found. Kerguelen is 1,400 square miles in area, but is largely a mass of bare peaks thrusting up out of the sea, the highest being 6,120 feet.

On the volcanic rocks the foraging marooners found patches of tough grass, coarse ferns and lichens, of little use for food, but they encountered one plant which proved a boon in their distress. This was the "land cabbage," peculiar to Kerguelen, much like the common cabbage, but yielding an essential oil which proved to be wholesome and sustaining food for that cold, damp climate.

One bit of tragedy marked their unwilling stay. Three men seeking seals for eating were overtaken by a blizzard. One of the trio dropped on the bleak slopes and was frozen to death.

The "Isle of Desolation" has had infrequent visits from man since its discovery by a French explorer in 1772. Captain James Cook, the celebrated English discoverer, rested his sea-legs there in 1776. Occasionally it has been used by sealing and whaling ship enterprises.

In late 1874 and early 1875 it was invaded by expeditions of astronomers from the United States, England and Germany for observation of the transit of Venus across the face of the sun.

BANDITS MAY BE CAUGHT BY RADIO DEVICE

Chicago, (UP)—Chicago gangsters, who have managed to prosper generally despite tear bombs, armored cars, and elaborate police alarm systems, will have a new device to contend with in the near future.

With the installation of radio receiving sets in 105 police squad automobiles, the ether waves will be brought into action against gunmen and fugitives from justice. Police Commissioner Michael Hughes conceived the idea and has ordered the equipment.

According to police plans, a loop aerial will be installed in the top of the car and tuning dials will be arranged conveniently on the dashboard. A loud speaker will be placed above the driver's head, with ear-phones connected with the interior of the car.

It is planned to broadcast all police news on a low wave-length to which the sets in the automobiles will be tuned. Police in all parts of the city and suburbs will thus be warned immediately upon the discovery of crime.

"By means of the equipment," said Commissioner Hughes, "we can broadcast complete information to our men. Perhaps when the criminal has been captured, we will broadcast 'The Prisoner's Song.'"

Hitherto radio has played a negligible part in apprehending criminals. Commissioner Hughes is confident, however, that it will soon become a potent factor in capturing malefactors.

IRELAND GETS PORTRAIT

Dublin (AP)—A portrait by Gilbert Stuart of John Shaw, the first Irishman to become a citizen of the United States, has been presented to the national gallery of Ireland by Stevenson Scott of New York. He made the presentation in commemoration of the visit of President Cochrane last February to the Lotus club of New York, of which he is a member.
