

EDUCATIONAL CONFERENCES AT MONMOUTH

Monmouth, July 13.—The annual educational conference is to be held at Monmouth, July 21. The on the campus of the Oregon normal conference is being sponsored this year by the members of the Round-Table class, composed of experienced teachers, under the direction of Thomas H. Gentle.

Past conferences have always been of keen interest to educators throughout the state. This year's program, worked out by the class under the direction of Miss Agnes Matlock, Portland, chairman of the conference, promises to be of even greater interest.

The general topic will center around the raising of standards of teacher training. Many interesting speakers have agreed to help make the program one of great interest. Dr. W. H. Burton, Chicago university, will speak on "What a Prospective Teacher May Expect from Training."

Miss Julia Spooner, a class room teacher of Portland will offer some interesting material. "Entrance Qualifications for Teacher Training Institutions," is the subject of C. E. Franzen of San Jose Teacher college has chosen for his topic. C. A. Howard, state superintendent of schools, will give a talk on the "Tourist Teacher." Dr. C. A. Fisher, president of Bellingham Normal, will talk on the topic of "Who Dares to Teach Must Never Cease to Learn."

The last topic to be brought before the visiting educators will be limiting the certification of a teacher to the field of her preparation, by Dean Jewell of O. A. C.

Oregon Names

Compiled from Lewis A. McArthur's "OREGON GEOGRAPHIC NAMES" A recent book now on sale at book stores.

A favorite dish of the French, blood pudding, is responsible for the naming of Pudding river, which flows through Marion and Clackamas counties. About the time the union between the Northwest company and the Hudson's Bay company was consummated in 1821-22 Joseph Gervais and Etienne Lucier, accompanied by their families, were camping on the Hous-u-cha-chuck river, which was the Indian name of Pudding river. While there they experienced severe weather, accompanied with a snowstorm, which confined them to their lodges until compelled to go forth in search of game. They set forth for a little prairie along Pudding river, where the lower Indian trail crossed the stream. Here they shot a number of elk. The Indian women hearing the shooting and suspecting what was going on started with knives and vessels. They succeeded in saving the blood, which was soon made into the favorite French dish known as blood pudding, upon which, with While this feast was being enjoyed, elk meat they feasted sumptuously. Gervais and Lucier christened the stream Riviere au Boudin, or Pudding river.

SENDS SON TO DEATH TO SAVE TRAVELERS

BOY SCOUTS NOT TO CAMPAIGN ON FAIR SMOKERS

New York, July 13 (AP)—Use of Boy Scouts in a campaign to halt smoking by women, proposed by the Cleveland scout council, has been repudiated by the executive board of the Boy Scouts of America.

The Cleveland council recently adopted a resolution condemning advertisements tending to induce women to smoke cigarettes, and the scouts were urged to adopt as another "daily-good turn" the creation of sentiment against smoking by women.

James E. West, chief scout executive, in a letter to Floyd A. Rowe, president of the Cleveland council, took the latter organization to task for acting in a matter which is not in the province of a local council and which involves "misunderstanding as to the real aims and purposes of the Boy Scout movement."

"To us here," the letter said, "it is most unfortunate, and indeed absurd that a suggestion should be made by any representative of the boy scout movement that Boy Scouts would approach women smoking in public and ask them to give up the habit."

"Of course he does not smoke excessively," said Leatherman. "He smokes and chews moderately, and it seems to have no detrimental effect."

LEAGUE RECEIVES MANY DOCUMENTS

Geneva (AP)—League officials have estimated that 80,000 documents of an international character will be registered with the League of Nations during 1929.

They base this figure on the number deposited during the first quarter which average 200 daily from all over the world.

In 1920 the total number registered and deposited was 20,000 and the volume has shown a steady increase each year.
