FREIGHT RATES ON GRAIN HELD UNFAIR TO FARM

Portland, July 12 (AP)—A. G. Roberts of Wasco county was the principal witness today before the interstate commerce commission inquiry into grain freight rates.

Roberts offered detail figures intending to show that Oregon wheat growers are losing money. Asked if a three per cent reduction in railroad rates on grain would aid, he replied: "Every little bit helps."

Roberts said taxes have trebled in four years and that freight rates have increased in the same measure. With the increase in the cost of labor added, he said, many farmers have been ruined and all hit hard.

George A. Paulkner, head of the Oregon State Grange, with 15,000 members, declared his organization is demanding a freight rate that will permit wheat growers of Oregon, Washington and Idaho to compete with Canadian wheat.

He said the Canadian wheat grower can transport his grain by rail seven times as far as the Oregon man can, for the same rate. There is only one per cent difference in the railroad rate, Paulkner said, from Edmonton, Canada to Vancouver, B. C. than from Durfur, Ore. to Portland, Ore.

James Hill, Pendleton, president of the Umatilla Farm Bureau, was another witness today.

Charlotte, N. C., July 13 (AP)—Gutzon Borglum, sculptor and artist, is in this section on a strange quest, a search for a ragged young artist who "has a soul."

Borglum does not know his name, or what he does, or where he lives, only that it is somewhere in North Carolina. But he terms the boy a genius and is determined to find him. That is why he left his studio in San Antonio, Texas.

Some time ago the youth walked into Borglum's studio. He had come all the way from North Carolina to watch the sculptor at work. He brought with him a few poems, a sketch and a small model or two. He wanted Borglum to pass upon them.

The sculptor was busy. The boy sat all day watching him. At nightfall he left, saying there was a job in North Carolina that he had to get back to.

Three or four days passed before Borglum paid attention to the poems, the sketch and the small models. Then his search began.

"That boy has a soul," Borglum said in Greensboro yesterday before leaving for Raleigh to continue his search. "That boy has a soul and I don't even remember his name. I call him a genius; there was life in what he said."

"I want to find that boy. I want to tell him that whatever others think of him, I believe he is a genius. I want to help him, too, if I can."

Eugene, July 13 (AP)—Relation of the Oregon Baptist convention to the First Baptist church of Salem and to Rev. Robert L. Payne, its pastor, will be thoroughly threshed out before a committee of 15 members. Rev. Payne will submit himself to "trial" before eight persons named by his own church and seven named by Dr. Daniel Bryant of Corvallis, outgoing convention president.

All evidence relative to the credentials of Mr. Payne will be presented, and a report will be made at a future convention.

Rev. M. B. Woodworth of Coquille offered a resolution for the appointment of a committee of 15, eight appointed by the First Baptist church of Salem, but not members of that church, and seven by the outgoing chairman of this convention, provided he appointed no one who sat in a previous council on this matter.

LA FOLLETTE TO RUN UPON HIS OWN PLATFORM

Fond du Lac, Wis., July 13 (AP)—Senator Robert M. La Follette will seek reelection to the United States congress on his own minority platform, and not on the plank adopted by the national republican convention, he said last night in a speech here.

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ANTI AL SMITH TEXANS BARRED FROM TICKET

Dallas, Tex., July 13 (AP)—The names of Texas democratic candidates for state office who have refused to work for the election of Governor Alfred E. Smith, today were barred from primary ballots in three counties pending the outcome of a test case.

The third reversal for democratic party bolters came yesterday when the Galveston county executive committee refused to place the name of Thomas B. Love and other anti-Smith democrats on the ballots for the primary, July 28. Love, former democratic national committeeman and a leader of the ultra dry faction of the party in Texas, is a candidate for lieutenant governor.

Prior to the action of the Galveston county committee, Love's name was barred from ballots in Cameron county when a district court judge denied an application for a writ of mandamus to compel the committee to recognize his candidacy. His appeal from this decision is pending before the civil court of appeals at San Antonio.

LIGHTNING KILLS MEXICAN ACE

Mount Holly, N. J., July 13 (AP)—County Detective Arthur Carabine telephoned police headquarters here today that he had identified the body of an aviator found near Burlington as that of Captain Emilio Carranza, the Mexican good will flier.

According to Carabine, the identification was made by a telegram in the aviator's pocket. The telegram was addressed to Carranza and sent by the United States weather bureau. It advised him concerning conditions along the route he intended to fly from Roosevelt Field to Mexico City.

The telegram was sent to Carranza at Mitchell Field.

The body was badly burned and mangled, Carabine reported. The plane, he said, evidently had been struck by lightning.

SOLONS BAR LEAGUE HEAD

Boston, July 13 (AP)—William M. Forgrave, superintendent of the Massachusetts Anti-Saloon league, today stood under censure of the house of representatives and in addition was barred from privileges accorded to legislative agents.

The house so voted, 97 to 83, yesterday after a warm debate on the report of a special committee which investigated Forgrave's charges of an alleged "party" at the time of the last prorogation.

Forgrave had charged that the party "reminds one of the drunken parties held in the back room of the saloons in the days before prohibition," but when called to testify admitted that he had no personal knowledge.

THREE BURNED TO DEATH IN PLANE

Houston, July 13 (AP)—Three men were believed to have been burned to death when an airplane crashed at Palacios, Texas, about 95 miles from here at noon today. Witnesses said they saw three men enter the plane, which crashed into the town and burned up before rescuers could reach it.

CITY'S EXPERT MAKES ATTACK ON COMMISSION

Portland, Ore., July 13 (AP)—Declaring that Oregon's public service commission "long ago ceased to function in the interest of the people," Kenneth G. Harlan, rate expert retained by the city of Portland, today issued a statement in which he said that if the people of Oregon secure lower rates "at the hands of the Oregon public service commission, they will have to rise in their might and demand them."

The statement was made in commenting upon the commission's order yesterday with reference to the valuation of the properties of the Portland electric power company.

"Until Oregon secures a public service commission that will protect its people rather than the public utility corporations there is little or no hope of obtaining sufficiently low power rates for the private companies to attract industries to the state," Harlan said.

Speaking at the commission's order yesterday he continued: "In this order the public service commission re-affirms its 1916 and 1917 valuation of the properties of the company."

"It is true that the commission indicated in the order a willingness to modify or alter the valuation on what it termed a proper showing, but that was merely an idle gesture."

ASSERTS CUBA FAVORS SMITH

Havana, July 13 (AP)—United States Ambassador Judah's statement printed in Cuban papers that Cuba favors the election of Hoover are challenged by the Havana paper El Mundo, which says:

"Ambassador Judah is allowing political affiliations with Hoover to overshadow Cuban wishes, which are for Smith, because of the latter's declarations favoring lower tariff on Cuban exports to the United States. Smith's election is favored by Cuba, but Judah couldn't say so."

El Mundo also denies the statement attributed to Ambassador Judah that Cubans are satisfied with Coolidge policies.

ALEX R. PEACOCK, STEEL KING, DIES

New York, July 13 (AP)—Alexander R. Peacock, one of Andrew Carnegie's "young men" whom the steel king led to fortune in the 90's is dead. Pneumonia proved fatal at St. Vincent's hospital yesterday, he was 66 years old.
