AUTO EXPENSE BILL REJECTED

With Aldermen Dancy and Patton refusing to vote and Herrick, Purvine, Rosebraugh, Simeral and Thompson voting in the negative, the city council last night refused to approve expense claims of City Bridge Engineer R. A. Furrow, and D. P. Thayer, one of his assistants, for the use of their automobiles in the service of the city.

Furrow's claim was 10 cents a mile for 38 miles of travel, and Thayer's was 10 cents a mile for 61 miles of travel.

Alderman Townsend, chairman of the bridges committee, moved that the claims be allowed, and Purvine asked for an aye and no vote.

Dancy objected that the claims should be presented in the regular way with full approval of the committee.

To this City Recorder Poulsen replied that the claims had the approval of the bridge committee but not of the committee on accounts and current expenses.

Dancy continued by declaring that rate of 10 cents a mile was too high that most corporations allow only seven cents, and that the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph company with which he is connected, allows seven cents. Also he opined that seven cents was the government rate.
