

HUBBARD OPENS SCHOOL PERIOD MONDAY A. M.

Hubbard, Sept. 13.—School will open Monday, with the following teaching personnel:

Superintendent, J. R. Bldgood and who will also teach in the high school. Mrs. Phyllis Copeland Finigan will teach English and allied subjects. Miss Thelma Kitchen, commercial and domestic science. Mrs. Finigan is from Portland and this is her second year here. Miss Kitchen's home is in LaGrande and she is a recent graduate from the state university.

In the grades Arthur Myers of Independence will be in charge of the seventh and eighth grades and also will superintend playgrounds and athletics. He will replace W. E. Dillon who held this position for three years. Mrs. C. E. Duncan who has taught the primary grades for seven years will again have the primary work.

The other teachers Miss Beryl Blosser of Hubbard, Mrs. Maude Dick of Hubbard and Mrs. Lottie Fry of Aurora will be placed by the superintendent in the second, third, fourth, fifth and sixth grades.

Miss Blosser grew to womanhood in Hubbard and is a graduate of the normal at Monmouth. She has done practice teaching beside teaching one year in one of the adjacent country districts. Mrs. Dick has taught in the Whiskey Hill school east of town while Mrs. Fry has taught at the same school as well as in other nearby schools. This is her second year in Hubbard. Myers taught at Coquille last year holding a position similar to the one he is to hold here.

C. R. Painter, building and grounds superintendent, who has been with the school for four years, will again be in charge of this work and will be assisted by Franklin de Lempriere, one of the seniors. The school has been thoroughly cleaned and the grounds have been taken care of, the wood stored, the furnace tried out and even the bell has been rung to see that everything will go with a bang from the first moment on in this coming school year.

LIGHTS PLANNED FOR EMERGENCY AIRPORT

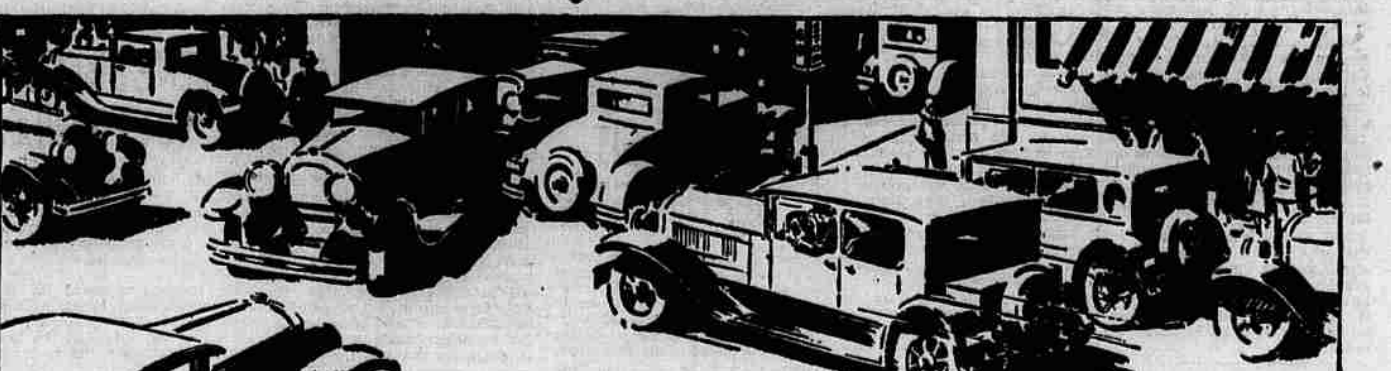
