MORTGAGE RELEASE IS SOUGHT IN SUIT

The Salem Bank of Commerce has filed an answer in circuit court to the suit of Anderson & Rupert seeking to get a mortgage out of escrow involving the new Nelson building on North Liberty street.

The bank alleges in its answer that in April, 1927, A. C. Nelson and wife desired to construct a building on their property and made arrangements with the Equitable Savings & Loan association for a \$35,000 mortgage, the money, however, to be paid only in nature of advances on construction and to such extent as needed. It was arranged when the building was constructed then a new mortgage was to be put on the entire property for \$50,000, minus such advances as had been made. However, the answer states, no money for advances was drawn from the original mortgage and when the building was completed the Nelsons desired to secure their loan elsewhere and asked for cancellation of the \$35,000 mortgage. This was done, the answer stated, and the satisfied mortgage turned over to the Nelsons.

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Chicago, Sept. 21 (P)—Two thousand students of Penger high school declared a strike today and refused to attend class in protest against transfer of a group of negro pupils from Morgan Park to Penger.

So riotous were the strikers that a detail of police was summoned to patrol the school district.

Thomas C. Hill, principal of the school, called a meeting of the student body for later in the day and said he hoped to dispel any ill feeling. He declared the transfer of the negro students was unavoidable inasmuch as they could not get the subjects they desired at the Morgan Park school.

FEAR LABOR UNION HEAD MURDERED

Detroit, Sept. 21 (P)—Fear that Max Ruben, secretary of the motion picture operators union of Detroit was slain by labor racketeers who abducted him from his office yesterday has been expressed by police.

Ruben was kidnapped by eight armed men while a score of office attaches were held at bay with pistols. The labor leader reported to police last week that he feared he was to be "taken for a ride," but was unable to furnish authorities with the identity of his alleged persecutors.

Ruben had been attending his business during the past week under protection of an armed guard, police learned.

CASCADIA RESORT SOLD FOR \$100,000

W. Lamb, federal highway engineer, according to a card received by Mrs. W. C. Hawley, from her sister, Margaret Giesendorf, Giesendorf is giving immediate possession. R. W. The purchase price is reported to be \$100,000, with a down payment of \$15,000 and the balance in deferred payments over a period of 50 years.

Cascadia is located on the south fork of the Santiam river about 65 miles southeast of Salem.

New York, Sept. 21 (P)—Democratic National Chairman John J. Backus announces campaign gifts of \$25,000 from William H. Woodin, president of the American Car & Foundry company, and of \$5,000 from George F. Johnson, of the upstate shoe firm of Endicott & Johnson.

Woodin is normally a republican, but recently announced that he would support Governor Smith. Johnson is the father-in-law of William H. Hill, Hoyer manager for New York state, but his political affiliations were not known at democratic headquarters here.

BIG DIRIGIBLE ON NEW FLIGHT

Friedrichshafen, Germany, Sept. 21. (P)—The dirigible Graf Zeppelin, in which Dr. Hugo Eckner intends to fly to America, ascended at 8 a. m. Thursday for a second flight over Southern Germany.

The airship took a westerly course, its objective depending on the weather, which was glorious at the start. After cruising over Lake Constance, the dirigible crossed into Switzerland, flew over Zurich at 8:50 and Basle at 9:22. It then turned toward Freiburg.

In addition to a crew of 39, the Graf Zeppelin carried 16 newspapermen and 15 mechanics from the Friedrichshafen works.

Lieutenant Commander Charles E. Rosendahl, U. S. N., Commander of the dirigible Los Angeles, and John E. Kehl, American consul at Stuttgart, were also aboard.

The dirigible flew over Baden-Baden at 11:30, over Karlsruhe at 11:45 and the continued northwards. Clouds were beginning to interfere with visibility.
