

MAJOR LEAGUE DRAMA CENTERS IN AMERICAN

CARDS LOOM AS SURE-CHAMPS IN NATIONAL RACE

New York, Sept. 21. (AP)—The St. Louis Cardinals were cheerfully confident today of coasting through to another National league championship after their even break with the New York Giants at the Polo Grounds.

The two clubs each have but nine more games to play, and the Cardinals lead of two full games looks larger every day. Having beaten Larry Benton, the league leaders feel they have spiked the Giants' biggest gun by proving that McGraw's star right hander is not invincible at this stage of the pennant race.

With the exception of two more games with New York, one on Saturday and one to wind up the season on September 30, the Cardinals will have Brooklyn and Boston as opponents from now on, while the Giants are playing the Cubs and the Reds, all of which favors Bill McKechnie's club.

On the attack, the Cardinals look like a championship ball club, especially under circumstances like yesterday when George Harper was delivering no fewer than three home runs in a single game and Frisch, High and Hafez were pounding the ball like demons. Defensively, however, the league leaders leave something to be desired, giving the impression of being a tired lot of ball players. Errors of commission and omission paved the way for their defeat by the Giants in the second game.

The Giants are far from being a beaten ball club. They may find the handicap of two games in nine too much to make up, but it is obvious that they will be in there fighting from the first pitch to the last.

Fox's manager, John Orr, says he would be delighted to get his boy in the ring with the Portlander but wants Fox in the city two or three weeks before the event. Fox is working in a hop yard at the present time but is expected in the city by the end of next week.

Fox fought several times in Portland last winter and beat boys that previously had taken a draw with Gordon.

Plant is of the opinion that Fox is a corner and will give Gordon the battle of his life. Should the independence lad get a draw or win over Gordon, Plant plans to get Bates back in the city and match the two, thus making two fine cards.

The matchmaker is working on several good preliminaries but as yet is not ready to announce the principals.

There is a possibility that a show will be put before the Fox-Gordon bout, in the event Fox wants a little extra time to get into condition.

DELANEY PUNCH STILL WICKED, TASSI ADMITS

New York, Sept. 21. (AP)—Back in the good graces of the New York boxing fans, Jack Delaney, of Bridgeport, Conn., today made preparations to regain the light heavyweight title he renounced last year to enter the heavyweight division. Delaney convinced 10,000 fans last night at Ebbetts Field that he still can punch in his own division, even if he can't hit with the heaves. He scored a technical knockout over Nando Tassi, a tough but raw Italian light heavyweight, in the 11th round of their scheduled 15 round bout.

Referee Eddie Forbes, the veteran ring official who stopped the Tunney-Heenebout, did the same thing in the same round last night. He patted Delaney on the back after 25 seconds of fighting in the 11th with Tassi hopelessly beaten.

His face covered with blood which streamed from a broken blood vessel over his nose, Tassi was a pitiful sight. Delaney hit Tassi a few times with his jabbing left at the start of the 11th, and then looked at Referee Forbes in appeal for him to end the bout.
