

OS WEST HOLDS SMITH SINCERE IN BOOZE STAND

Portland, Sept. 21.—Oswald West, ex-governor and democratic national committeeman for Oregon, said last night in a speech before the Smith-Presidential club at the public library that he will not allow "minor differences" between his views and those of Al Smith to keep him from voting for the democratic presidential candidate.

"Some of my dry friends ask me how I can bring myself to support Smith after opposing him in the primaries," stated West. "My answer is that I am a democrat and that I look upon the primaries as the place to settle all differences as to party candidates. I preferred Walsh because of his views on the liquor question. I didn't get him, so I accept Smith."

"I am not in accord with Governor Smith's personal views on the question. Yet I look upon them as views of an honest and fearless man, who recognizes the evils which prevail today, and hopes to provide a remedy."

HALDENE NOT TO RETURN TO W. U.

Another one of Coach Keene's regulars of last year has notified him that he will not be back in school this year. Yesterday the coach received a letter from Raymond Haldene, who played end during the football season in 1927, saying that he was in Alaska and had decided not to enter school this term. Traylor, another letterman

from last year is not yet in school, but is expected any day now.

The athletic board of the university has decided to have a freshman football team this year. This will be the first time that the blue-jackets institution has had a yearling football team and was necessitated by the large turn-out of prospective players. Between 50 and 60 suits have been issued and as soon as practicable the squad will be divided.

GRADE CROSSING ORDER ALLOWED

The county court today was signing a new vacation order in the matter of four grade crossings between Marion and Jefferson which were eliminated by the installation of an overhead crossing between those two towns, put in jointly by the county and the Southern Pacific. By the signing of this vacation order the Southern Pacific will pay to the county around \$12,000 which is its share in the matter of the construction of the crossing.

The crossings have been actually vacated and put out of use for some time, but some technical errors were made in regard to the first vacation orders and the orders had to be prepared and signed all over again. And in the meantime the railroad company has been holding on to its \$12,000 until the legal technicalities involved were ironed out.

JEFFERS CHIEF OF OPERATION UNION PACIFIC

Omaha, Neb., Sept. 21 (P)—William M. Jeffers will become vice-president in charge of operation of the Union Pacific system October 31, President Carl R. Gray announced.

Mr. Jeffers succeeds E. E. Calvin, veteran operating head, who retires on that date. Mr. Calvin will be 70 years old October 18.

N. A. Williams, now general superintendent at Cheyenne, Wyo., will succeed Mr. Jeffers as general manager of the Union Pacific railroad, the largest unit of the Union Pacific system.

Both Mr. Calvin and Mr. Jeffers began with the Union Pacific as boys, the former at 18 years of age, and Mr. Jeffers at 14. The new vice-president is 52 years old.

Mr. Jeffers' first job was messenger boy. Later he learned telegraphy. Then on up he went—train dispatcher, chief dispatcher, train master at Green River, Wyo., division superintendent, and general manager in 1917.

For five years Mr. Jeffers was chairman of the committee of general managers of railroads handling the labor disputes in western territory.

CIVIL WAR VETS' CLOSE SESSION

Denver, Colo., Sept. 21 (P)—Veterans of the Grand Army of the Republic were homeward bound today after having bid farewell to comrades of other states until the next encampment is held in Portland, Maine, in 1929.

With the election of new officers, headed by John Reese of Broken Bow, Neb., as commander in chief the 52nd annual meeting closed here last night.

James E. Jewell, Colorado's candidate for commander in chief, had withdrawn when the nominations were made. He was elected senior vice commander in chief by acclamation.

Other officers elected were: Henry J. Kearney, New York City, junior vice commander; Dr. S. W. Hopkins, Lodi, Calif., surgeon general; and J. King Olson, Dayton, Ohio, chaplain in chief.

Commander Reese appointed Thomas J. Smith of Nebraska, Nebraska national adjutant general. He appointed George A. Hoxley, chief of staff; C. D. R. Stowitz, Buffalo, N. Y., quartermaster general and Samuel P. Town of Philadelphia, assistant quartermaster general.

Stayton, Sept. 21.—Prospects for football at Stayton high school are much brighter than last year. About 20 players have answered Coach Mauney's call, and the first practice was held Thursday.

The team will be composed almost entirely of green men, there being only five lettermen on hand. They are Lesley, Phillips, backfield; Darby, Shaw and Sigmund, line.

WAR TO-FINISH DECLARED UPON CHICAGO MAFIA

Chicago, Sept. 21.—Police today declared a "war without mercy" on Chicago's Mafia.

The move resulted from a conference in criminal court between Judge Frank Comerford and Commissioner of Police William F. Russell. Judge Comerford entered the case when he refused to grant a writ of habeas corpus for Angelo Pettiti, held as a suspect in the kidnapping of Miss Billy Ranieri by Mafia extortionists.

The release of the boy after he was held 13 days on a "kidnap farm" followed the judge's decision to hold Pettiti.

The hearing in criminal court, during which Judge Comerford issued the order for "removal by annihilation" of Mafia blackmailers, was attended by the boy, A. Frank Ranieri, his father, and the mother, Edward Pirpe, vice consul for the

Italian people in Chicago, was present at the request of citizens of the Italian quarter who were clamoring for the wiping out of Mafia activities of which they have been victims.
