Banquet Closes State Conference

One of the most successful and most enjoyable state conferences ever held by Oregon Daughters of the American Revolution closed last night with a banquet at the Marion hotel when additional honor was given to the president-general of the national society of the Daughters, Mrs. Alfred J. Brosseau, of Washington, D. C., and the vice-president-general, Mrs. Sherman Walker of Seattle, whose visit to Oregon occasioned the calling of yesterday's conference.

Covers were placed for 135 at the banquet last night and Mrs. E. C. Apperson, of McMinnville, state regent, presided in a most charming manner. Greetings were brought by Mrs. Homer Goulet, regent of Chemeketa chapter, hostess at the conference. Governor Isaac Lee Patterson was an additional honor guest and speaker at the banquet.

The importance of national defense and the dangers of extreme pacifism were stressed by Mrs. Sherman Walker, national vice-president, in her talk, both at the banquet last night and during the afternoon session of the conference. The president-general, Mrs. Brosseau, gave her second impressive and inspiration address of the day at the banquet last night.

The guests were extravagant in their praise of the entertainment features arranged for the banquet. Cello, violin and piano trios were given by Dr. R. W. Hans Seltz and Mr. and Mrs. Ruthyn Turney. Vocal solos were given by Miss Nancy Thielson and Edward Fisher.

At the afternoon conference session addresses were made by Mrs. Sherman Walker and by the state regent, Mrs. E. C. Apperson. Each chapter regent present was allowed to query the president-general on matters of importance to the chapter and organization. State committees reported and the Daughters' pledge was given by Mrs. Frances M. Wilkins, ex-state regent.

Mrs. Arthur Rahn sang several vocal solos in the afternoon. Mrs. Brosseau, the honor guest, was showered with gifts from the various chapters and organizations. A crystallized rose was given the president-general by Multnomah chapter of Portland with Mrs. J. Theoburn Ross, regent, making the presentation.
