

WEEK-END FOR ENDEAVORERS PRATUM EVENT

Pratum, Ore., Oct. 13.—A big event for Pratum is the county Christian Endeavor convention being held Friday evening, Saturday and Sunday.

The theme of the entire convention will be "A Crusade with Christ." The keynote address was given Friday night by Rev. Norman E. Tully of Salem. His topic was, "Why a Crusade." Rev. Tully's address was followed by a social period and closing devotionals.

Saturday morning at 9 o'clock the session opened with a song service followed by devotionals led by Viola Ogden of Portland, state Christian Endeavor secretary. Talks on graded Endeavor by four speakers: "Junior Endeavor" was discussed by Ella Smith and "High School Endeavor" by J. S. Hanes of Lathrop Center; "Young People's Endeavor," by L. Clarke Aydelott of Eugene, and Elizabeth M. Hogg of Salem, "Adult Endeavor."

MRS. ALLEN HOSTESS FOR BRIDGE GROUP

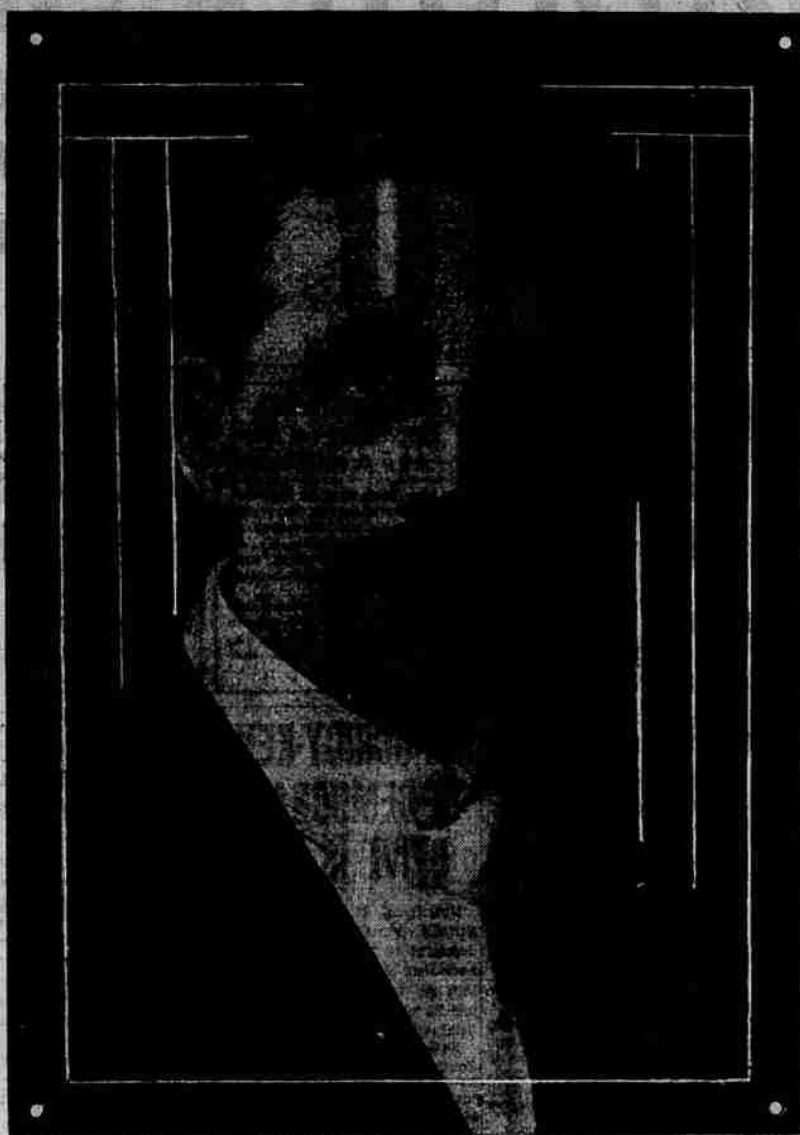
