

MC EWAN SHAPING OREGON ELEVEN

Salem Wins, Showing Power

BEARCATS TO TEST METAL OF WEBFOOTS

Today's game with Willamette's Bearcats will be in the nature of a crucible for Coach McEwan of the Oregon Webfoots. For upon the showing of his gridiron warriors will no doubt depend the personnel of the team for the remainder of the season, and for the contest with the Washington Huskies in Portland next Saturday in particular.

Captain McEwan has been experimenting all during the pre-conference season and started what appeared to be a winning aggregation against Stanford last Saturday, if a little more polish and speed can be put into their play. Injuries, however, have upset his plans to a great extent and there is a battle royal on between the backfield men for the position of half back left vacant by the breaking of a bone in Mason's leg, suffered during scrimmage this week.

McEwan is planning several new combinations and the tilt with Willamette today is expected to give him a slant on the best machine that can be developed this season.

Bob Robinson, who did excellent work against the Cardinals Saturday during the second half, may be placed in the halfback berth permanently. However, "Whippet" Ord and Cecil Gabriel are two other backfield men that would be anxious to wait their opportunity to show what they can do. Ord, who tips the beam at 145, is handicapped by lack of weight, while Gabriel cannot approach Mason in speed. Charles Williams, reserve fullback, and one of the best defensive backs on the Webfoot squad may be shifted to one of the halfback positions, and Choppie Parke, quarterback, may be used, too. Another possible combination may be Kitzmiller at half and Cooter Gould at Salem boy, at full. Gould was in the lineup last year a good percentage of the time, but has been warming the bench during most of the pre-conference season.

Two or three entirely distinct Oregon teams will probably be used today, with the aggregation which played against Stanford starting during the first half and a second team taking up the burden during the fore part of the second half. If he isn't entirely satisfied as to which is the better combination, in all likelihood Coach McEwan will shove his first string back into the fray again.

CORVALLIS BEATEN BY TURNER SCHOOL

Turner, Oct. 13.—The Turner high school football team won the opening game of the season by defeating the Corvallis team with a one-sided score of 20 to 0. The local boys opened up their attack in the first quarter and continued hammering on the Corvallis line netting them two touchdowns and a safety in the first half. A final touchdown in the last quarter nearing the end of the game showed the power of the Turner team which this year is rather light in weight but strong on determination. None of the points after touchdowns were converted.

Merle Enley, full-back played a stellar game. Calling signals he showed real football to the Corvallis eleven, who found it difficult to effectively stem the Turner rushes. On a kickoff Enley kicked from the 40 yard line over the Corvallis goal-line. On an aerial attack he passed a long spiral to Pearson for about a 25 yard gain.

The next game is with Stayton here next Friday.

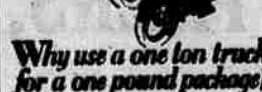

SEALS LEADING IN TITLE PLAY

Sacramento, Calif., Oct. 13 (AP)—San Francisco took the lead Friday in the coast league baseball play-off by defeating Sacramento, 9 to 4. The series now stands two games to one for the Seals.

Timely base hitting with the steady pitching of Hollis Thurston enabled the Seals to chalk up the victory and take the lead and get a firmer hold on the largest share of the \$15,000 pot to be split 60-40 between the two teams.

The Senators took a lead by pushing over three runs on the third canto, but Nick Williams' lads offset the one run margin of the Solons by scoring five runs in the eighth and ninth frames. A crowd of 8,000 fans watched the game.



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WASCO LOSES TO CHARGING LOCALS 34-0

Salm high's black suited warriors were too powerful and too fast for the little band of football players from Wasco and the lads from the wheat fields of eastern Oregon returned home Friday evening after going down to a 34 to 0 defeat.

The purple clad players from Sherman county were crushed right from the start, when Jones, right tackle for Salem, burst through the line on an attempted Wasco punt and recovered near the goal line. It took but three line plays by Backe, Charles Kelly and Blaco to make the first score.

VISITORS OUTCLASSED
The eastern Oregonians put up a gallant fight all the way through and in the closing minute of the last quarter made a first down from scrimmage, the only one that they succeeded in making through the line.

The inability of the purple and gold to hold the fast charging forwards was responsible to a large degree for the score which was rolled up against them. Two times during the first quarter Jones blocked Wasco punts, the second one being converted into a touchdown by Jones, who picked up the blocked ball on the run and raced 20 yards to the goal line. Again in the second quarter Salem blocked a Wasco kick, the ranchers recovering this one on their 5-yard line. The next punt went barely 25 yards and with the Kellys, Blaco and McIntosh doing the brunt of the work, soon had another counter. Chippy Kelly bucked the ball over for the extra point after Blaco had made the first touchdown and a similar play gave the red and black the extra point after Jones' touchdown. McIntosh, who went in for Backe at left half half, plunged over for the third touchdown but an attempted pass for the extra counter went wild and the half ended with the score Salem 20; Wasco 0.

PLAYER DIES AT ASHLAND FROM INJURY

Ashland, Ore., Oct. 13 (AP)—Max Newsome, star quarterback of the southern Oregon normal school football team, died in a local hospital Friday night presumably from injuries received in a football game against the Oregon Agricultural college roots team yesterday.

Newsome was rushed to the hospital after he had collapsed on the field. A few minutes before, he had taken a big drink of water and complained that it "went down the wrong funnel." Suddenly, he toppled over and was carried from the field.

At the hospital, his condition became critical and he was said to be suffering from head injuries and a fractured skull.

Hoppe and Layton Play Exhibition Match Here; Both Artists With Cue

John Layton, national three cushion billiard champion, and Willie Hoppe, world's 18-1 ballline billiard champion will appear here in a 100 point three cushion match at the Bligh Billiard parlor Monday at 3:30 and 8 p. m.

The Layton and Hoppe combination is without a doubt the leading billiard attraction of this time. They come as touring partners but their matches are a distinct departure from the ordinary exhibition, inasmuch as they both try for victory, which calls for all the cue cunning which they possess. Layton, who is now national champion, defeated Hoppe for the title in the final game of the last national championship tournament. He also held the title in 1920, 1921, 1922, and 1923. He was the world's pocket billiard champion in 1916.

The veteran Hoppe is the most famous of all billiardists. He became famous in 1907 when, as a mere boy in his teens, he won the world's 18-2 ballline title in a tournament against the world's leading billiardists. He still holds the world's 18-1 ballline title which he won in 1910 from Maurice Vignaux.

SILVERTON HIGH WINNER 12 TO 6
Silverton, Oct. 13.—Silverton high school defeated Independence high school 12 to 6 on the local field Friday afternoon, making up for the same last year. Ernie Larson, fullback, romped 40 yards for the first touchdown after receiving a punt and Independence returned the compliment, tying the score. Paul Relling, quarter, bucked the line for the winning and final score. Efforts to convert failed. Officials of the game were Woodworth, Willamette university, umpire; Sparks, Willamette university, referee and Lloyd Kucker, head linesman.

DALLAS SCHOOL BESTS STAYTON
Dallas, Ore., Oct. 13.—Before a large crowd of Polk county fair visitors, the small Dallas high school 11 defeated Stayton high 14 to 6. The Dallas boys decisively outplayed Stayton, making 13 first downs to Stayton's four. The score would probably have been larger had Dallas not fumbled at critical times.

Dallas started the scoring in the second period. With the ball on the Stayton 40 yard line, they executed a reverse play on which Captain Vaughan crossed the Stayton goal line. LeFors carried the ball around left end for the extra point.

There was no more scoring until the middle of the fourth period when Dallas took the ball at mid-field and drove consistently for a touchdown. Uglow and Vaughan carried the ball through the line and around end, and Vaughan completed passes to LeFors and Dunn, which brought the ball to the Stayton five yard line. Vaughan carried it off tackle to the one yard line and Uglow drove inside of tackle for a touchdown. Vaughan converted the extra point on an off-tackle play.

BROOK TROUT STOLEN
