The supreme court today, in an unanimous oral opinion, held that the word "progressive" shall not appear on the ballot after the names of the democratic presidential ticket. The opinion affirms Judge George R. Bagley of the lower court who held that the progressives are not qualified political party in Oregon and had no right as a party to endorse the democratic candidates.

It was explained that the court handed down an oral opinion for the convenience of the secretary of state in correcting his certification to the county clerks, and that a written opinion will be handed down next Tuesday. Chief Justice Rand and Justice Roseman, who are candidates did not sit.

The only clothing left to Mr. Volk was his bathing trunks, rubber boots, old overalls and a slouch hat.

Partial insurance is said to be carried on the dwelling, which will be rebuilt, according to Mr. Volk's plans.
