

PARADE AND PROGRAM OFFERED AT SILVERTON

CELEBRATION OF ARMISTICE IS QUIET ONE

Silverton, Nov. 13.—Armistice Day came in bright and sunny with the celebration starting with a parade formed at the Southern Pacific depot.

The three American Legion flag bearers led the march, they were followed by automobiles carrying the Civil war veterans and the women of the Relief Corps; then the 4-L band with nearly every man out and led by Hal Campbell. Behind the band came Company I in full uniform and full attendance; then the Legionnaires with their Legion caps, the boy and the girl Scout troops and lastly the students and pupils from the three school buildings.

The parade ended at the Armory where a goodly crowd had already gathered to listen to the prepared program which opened soon after 11 o'clock with a selection by the band; then the audience sang "America"; invocation by Rev. Father Scherberg of St. Paul's church; reading by Roger Comstock, senior high school student. The speaker of the day, Arthur Murphy, past commander, department of Oregon, was introduced by local Post Commander Arthur Simmons. Murphy gave a splendid address on the American Legion and what it is for the coming generation. A vocal solo by Martin Doerfler with Mrs. Gertrude Cameron at the piano; a piano solo by Hal Campbell; benediction by Rev. J. M. Jensen of the Immanuel Lutheran church. After the benediction the 4-L band rendered several selections.
