

CARL FENTON POST SPONSORS BIG CELEBRATION

DALLAS GIVES FULL PROGRAM ARMISTICE DAY

Dallas, Nov. 12.—Striding along with a healthy swing as if a stroll of 25.1 miles meant but little in his life, Harold Schroeder, young Salt Creek youth, led a field of 30 contestants and won first place in the Armistice day hike that ended on La Creole field just prior to the Independence-Dallas high school football game. He received \$25 cash for his efforts in covering the distance in four hours and 46 minutes, an average of more than six miles an hour. One minute and thirty seconds later Douglas Miller, Dallas, crossed the line followed by Alfred Rupp, Dallas, two and one-half minutes later. A fair portion of the 30 entrants finished. The men received \$15 and \$10.

Independence got the jump on Dallas high school and chalked up two touchdowns in the first half to clinch the county gridiron title. Pitching in old-fashioned dexterity, D. E. Janzen (52) and Lester George (50) placed first in the finals of the horseshoe pitching contest. Others in the elimination were T. Brown (48), E. A. Woods (48), George A. Woods (47), and Floyd Holt (37).

Swinging heavy on a driver, Homer Ellis knocked the little white sphere over the creek for first place in the golf ball driving contest, with Jack Eakin and Tracy Savery tied for second place.

In revenge for the football game, Dallas' hose cart team defeated the Independence team in a race between the two departments.

The bicycle races were staged, Eugene McDonald taking first; Edward Hamilton, second, and Jack Eakin, Jr., third, for the grade school boys and Milo Nelson, first, Robert Hughes, second and Warren Hinaman, third, for the junior high school boys.

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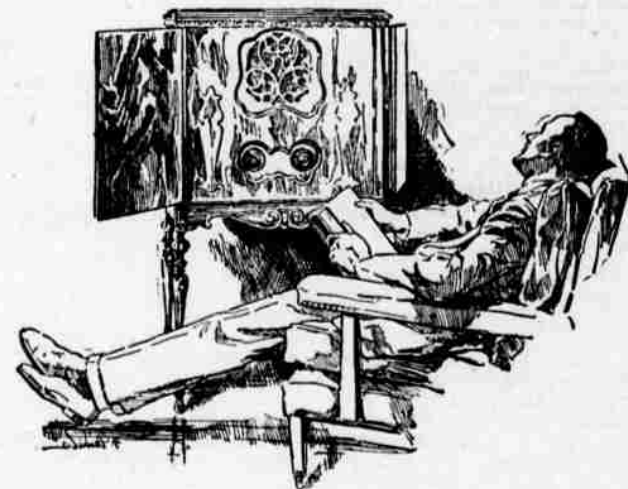
