LEANDER CLINE IS BURIED AT DALLAS

Dallas, Dec. 13.—Funeral services for Leander Cline were held at the Henkle chapel, Wednesday afternoon at 2 o'clock. Funeral services were conducted by Rev. Louis C. Kirby, pastor of the Methodist Episcopal church and interment held in the I. O. O. F. cemetery, Dallas.

Leander Cline was born in Ohio, January 3, 1846 and died December 1, 1928. He had been employed at the Gail hotel for several months, but nothing was known of his family. He was suffering from jaundice and he retired on Friday evening and when he did not appear on Saturday morning, Mr. Dunn, manager of the hotel, unlocked the finding Cline dead in bed. Coroner Henkle was called but found no inquest necessary.

Among his effects were letters from a sister-in-law, living in Astoria, Ohio. Mr. Henkle wired for disposal of the body and was instructed to arrange for burial here as all relatives were residents of eastern states.

Amity, Dec. 13.—Lucile Baxter, freshman of Amity high has returned to school after a six weeks' illness of scarlet fever.

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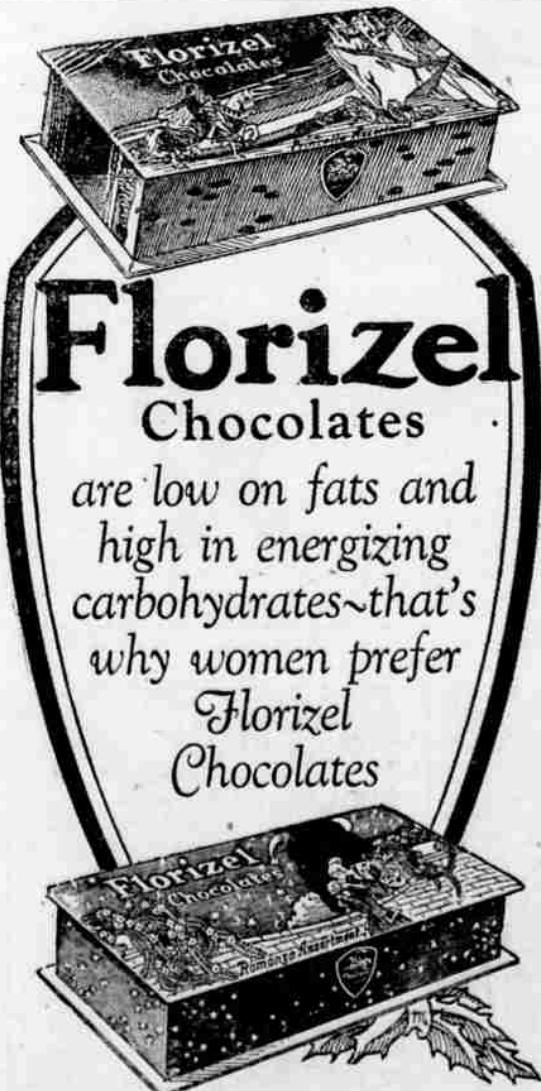
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
