GUARDIAN ASKED BY AGED CITIZEN

J. K. Sears, who a number of years ago was known as guardian of the state's funds and laws through a number of cases he appeared in as plaintiff from time to time attacking some state measure or project, has filed a petition in probate here asking that the First National bank be appointed a guardian of himself.

He represents that he has real property valued at \$10,000 and personal property around \$40,000. He declares that he is feeble in body and mind, being 81 years of age, that his memory is poor and that certain persons are endeavoring to impose on him and cheat and defraud him, causing him worry and bodily distress.

He asks that H. E. Eakin, E. F. Slade and C. W. Paulus be named appraisers of his estate.

hundred million dollars whenever the question came up. The argument they persistently advanced was that strict enforcement could not be effected on the appropriations made available in the past.

This argument, however, has been out of line with the ideas of the administration of the preponderant majority in congress whenever the question came to a vote, and only last week Representative La Guardia, republican, New York, was roared down when he undertook to add a similar item to the bill which then was before the house.

Explaining his amendment off the floor Senator Bruce said he pro-

posed the \$250,000,000 increase because Commissioner Doran of the prohibition bureau had declared recently that it would take \$300,000,000 to enforce the dry law.

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
