Mrs. Barnes was injured in an automobile accident last August from which she never recovered and has suffered intensely these past four months. Barnes was also injured, but has recovered sufficiently to be around his home, but still in a crippled condition.

Besides the husband, Mrs. Barnes is survived by two daughters, Mrs. Jessie Troyer of Canby and Mrs. Ruth Harper of New York, and four sons, Ward, Glenn and Jack at home and Earl of Portland. She also leaves a stepson, Harry Barnes of Kansas. The Barnes family is very well known in Marion county where they have resided for the past 20 years.

Funeral services will be held at the Methodist Episcopal church in Woodburn, Thursday afternoon at 2 o'clock with interment in Belle Pass cemetery.

SUICIDE WILL BE BURIED WEDNESDAY

Albany—Funeral services for Henry McNabb, 39, who committed suicide last Saturday evening when he shot himself through the mouth with a shot gun, will be held Wednesday afternoon from the Fisher Braden chapel. McNabb was to have returned to the government hospital at Walla Walla, Wash., for treatment for tuberculosis, which he had contracted during the war while in the United States navy.

He had been released from the hospital last April and it is believed by relatives that despondency over his condition caused him to take his life. He was found on his 11-acre farm near Knox Butte by

L. G. Carr Sunday afternoon. The body was found beside his bed. McNabb was born near Knox Butte, October 9, 1890. His parents were Mr. and Mrs. Alex McNabb. He is survived by his mother, Mrs. Ed Landis of Monmouth, and a half sister, Mrs. J. A. Bennett, Oakland, Cal., and two half brothers, Elmer and Glenn Landis of Monmouth.

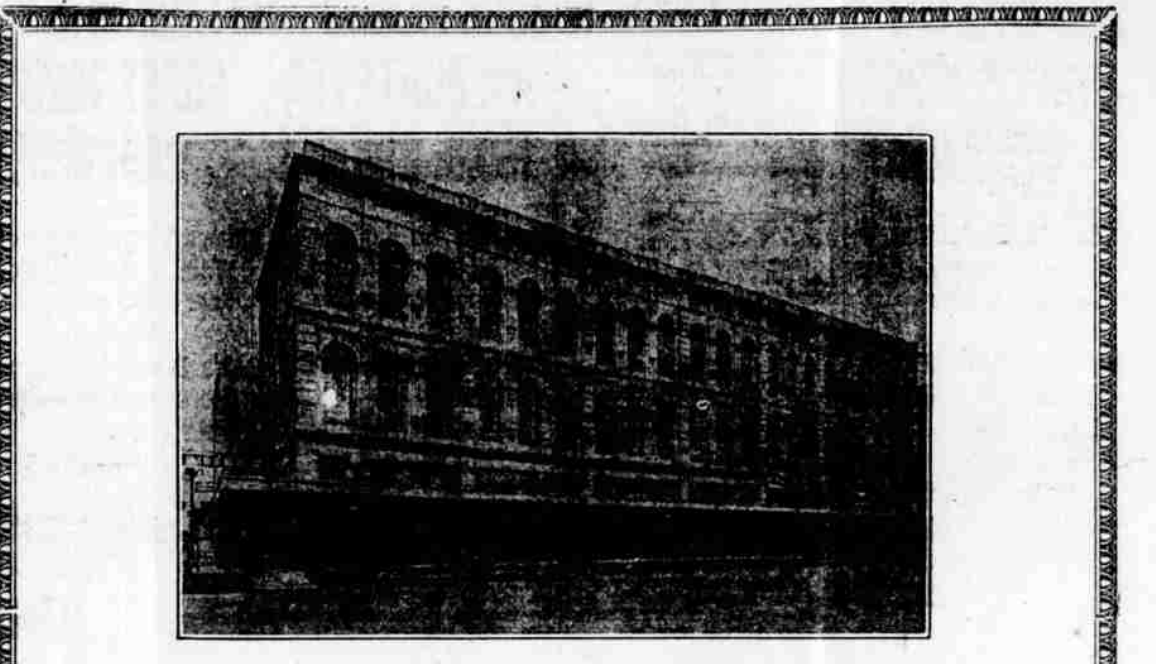
