

CALIFORNIA BEARS DOPED TO LOSE TO GEORGIA

TECH-BEARS GAME DRAWS FULL HOUSE

Pasadena, Cal. (AP)—Upon this football city, on this day of a bower of roses, the eyes of a football world centered Tuesday, watching the lashing combat of east and west in the annual New Year's day gridiron classic.

The struggle for the mythical supremacy of a nation, this crucible test that is the rose bowl classic brought together the Golden Tornado of Georgia Tech, unstoppable in its season in the southern conference, and the Golden Bears of California, stopped once, but powerful nevertheless. So intense was the interest in this struggle of the south's mightiest gridiron machine and one of the west's most powerful aggregations that a record number of some 70,000 held tickets to the picturesque Arroyo Seco bowl. The seat sale for the game exceeded by many thousands any of the past.

The general opinion was that the game was a toss-up with the breaks deciding whether the east or the west chalks a triumph.

California's strong defensive game had a rival of no mean caliber in the Tornado's forward wall. The Bears boasted a versatile running attack in addition to its strong defense with Benny Lom. Passing, charging and kicking half-back and Charles Schmidt, crashing full as its keymen.

The big story of the south swirled mainly around the triple threat activities of Warner Mizell, and his side winds, "Stumpy" Thompson and "Father" Lumpkin. The Tech line had Captain Peter Pund, all-American center as a 210-pound stone wall bulwark.

Pre-game statements by the respective coaches Clarence "Nibs" Price of California and W. A. Alexander of Tech, were terse and to the point.

From the diminutive Price: "Odds are against us, but that doesn't mean anything to us."

Said Alexander:

"We are all ready to win or lose. There will be no alibi."

'GREATEST FAN' NEVER SAW A FOOTBALL GAME

San Francisco, (AP)—Should an attempt be made to select the most enthusiastic football fan in America, San Francisco, will present the name of Harvey Arjer—even though he never saw a game.

Born under the Union Jack, at Middlesborough, Yorkshire, Arjer was reared on the English brand of ball and his conversion to the American game accomplished in the face of another and even more unpromising circumstance.

For more than seven years he has been a patient at the U. S. Marine hospital here with a dislocated vertebrae, or broken neck. His only acquaintance with the game has been via the radio but he has come to know hundreds of players by name and performance, and has acquired not only an intimate knowledge of the rules and of the styles of play of the various teams, but his judgment as to which team will win has come to be respected by the patients in his ward.

In June, 1921, Arjer shipped from Seattle on the West Kasoon as a ship's carpenter. In the harbor at Yokohama while doing repair work he fell from a box only a foot high and sustained the injury which has since kept him bedridden. Just prior to that time he had taken out his first papers and still hopes that some day he can complete his American citizenship.

GERMAN HEAVY BOXES SEKYRA FRIDAY NIGHT

New York (AP)—Max Schmeling, the German heavyweight "who looks like Jack Dempsey," will make his debut as a headliner at Madison Square Garden next Friday night.

The German, who really does have the facial characteristics of the popular ex-champion, will attempt to demonstrate any other qualities of the Manassa Mauler he may possess in his ten round bout with Joe Sekyra, Dayton, Ohio, youngster.

He is not the vicious, slashing type of fighter that Dempsey was. He is, rather, a methodical and precise battler who takes his opponents as they come and proceeds to "work on them" with coolness and deliberateness.

Some who have watched him fight are fooled by his method and figure him as rather slow.

Sekyra, while hardly the greatest heavyweight prospect in sight, is a worthy opponent for the shifty Max, boxing critics here believe.

Schmeling has been getting the most space in New York boxing columns in the past few days and it is not at all unlikely that that has something to do with his establishment as "favorite."
