WILD NEW YEAR'S IN LOS ANGELES; 1 DIES

Los Angeles, Calif. (AP)—One man died, two persons were shot, and more than 200 revelers received injuries which sent them to the receiving hospital in this city's wild reception of the babe of 1929.

Eddie Bernal was almost instantly killed when struck by a hit-and-run driver as he was crossing an intersection.

One man was shot in the foot by a reveler firing in a crowd on a downtown corner, and a woman was wounded when she came to the door of her home to watch a particularly noisy procession pass. Neither was seriously hurt, reports said.

The receiving hospital said that most of the cases treated Monday night were for bruises and abrasions.

Police raided dozens of cafes and night clubs during the night, but made no arrests.

PORTLAND BANK CLEARINGS BIG

Portland, Ore. (AP)—With a \$6,758,083 gain in bank clearings as an indication of business growth, Portland closed a prosperous year.

The bank clearing of 1928 reached the total of \$1,985,688,159.29.

The volume of mail handled by the local office showed a big increase in 1928, but because of a reduction in postal rates effective in July, actual receipts show a slight decline. The 1928 receipts were \$2,062,940.59 against \$3,101,195.45 for 1927.

Apple exports from the port of Portland in the season 1928-29 will exceed all previous years in volume, according to merchants exchange.

From August to the end of December 1,285,981 boxes were shipped and it is estimated that by the close of the season in April 1,600,000 boxes will have been exported, as against 358,620 boxes for the 1927-28 season.

Wheat exports in 1928 totaled 2,403,695 bushels, valued at \$2,789,675.43 as against 1,927 exports of 2,730,430 bushels, valued at \$3,445,309.

Flour exports in 1928 totaled 76,073 barrels, valued at \$371,257. In 1927 76,297 barrels, valued at \$411,971, were shipped.

General cargo shipped in 1928 was valued at \$1,699,819, a substantial increase over the 1927 value of \$1,049,215.

Lumber exports in 1928 totaled 37,375,586 feet of a value of \$828,318. Lumber exports in 1927 totaled 36,166,044 feet, valued at \$793,732.

OLD VETERANS ARE AROUSED

Lake Mills, Wis. (AP)—In a letter to members of the G. A. R. department of Wisconsin, G. H. Pounds, commander, and E. B. Melmetre, assistant adjutant general, vigorously attacked the introduction of two congressional bills by Representative Buikwick of North Carolina and asked for a petition of protest from all members.

The bills asked that the marine band be in attendance at the confederate veterans' reunion at Charlotte, N. C. June 4 to 7, 1929, and that the secretary of war provide bedding for use during the encampment.

"It is the duty of every Union veteran and every loyal citizen to protest against the bills just introduced and all further honoring of those who have been so honored only because they were rebels and traitors," the letter read.

CHAIN STORE BURNED OUT

Wenatchee, Wash. (AP)—A \$100,000 fire ushered in the new year in Wenatchee. It was said to be the largest fire in the city's history.

Starting from a furnace explosion, the blaze destroyed the two-story Gehl block, housing the Montgomery Ward and Company, the Clark-Massey furniture store and Gehl apartment house.

A large stock of tires in the basement of the Ward store was burning furiously when the fire department arrived at 12:10 a. m. Several tenants of the apartment house were stupefied by the smoke before being awakened and had to be carried out.

Although smoke poured from every window and door of the building for two hours, it was 2 o'clock before a blaze could be seen and 3 o'clock before it reached the roof.

Montgomery Ward company managers said a new store would be opened as soon as a location can be obtained and a stock received.

Paris, (AP)—Bathhouses which began their career 160 years ago with the court of Louis XIV as customers are being wrecked. The houses, which floated on the River Seine, were the first public baths in Paris.

NORTHCOTT MAY FACE 4 CHARGES IN JOINT TRIAL

Riverside, Calif. (AP)—An attempt will be made to combine four murder charges against Gordon Stewart Northcott into one trial, the district attorney's office announced.

When Northcott appears in superior court Wednesday to answer to the asserted slaying of an unidentified Mexican and Lewis and Nelson Winslow, the state will move that he be tried at the same time in connection with the death of Walter Collins.

San Quentin Prison (AP)—"If the boy hangs, I'll die."

Those were the words of Sarah Louise Northcott, mother of Gordon Stewart Northcott, accused Corona chicken ranch murderer, as she entered San Quentin prison at 9:15 a. m. to start a life sentence for the murder of little Walter Collins.

Mrs. Northcott was pale and wan as she prepared to be "dressed in" at the prison.

Evidently her thoughts centered upon her son's fate.

The mother's confession of the Collins murder was believed to have been prompted by the belief her act would aid Northcott in facing charges against him.

COPS HELD FOR DEATH OF MAN

Detroit (AP)—Beuren Garrell and Harry Lee, patrolmen attached to the Canfield station, were arrested early Tuesday on charges of manslaughter after the death of Harold Burkart, 28, a New Year's reveler, who witnesses said was struck by a bullet fired by one of the policemen.

An assistant prosecuting attorney said charges of manslaughter would be preferred against the person or persons firing the shot.

Stephen Kim, one of Burkart's companions, was wounded in the shoulder in the fusillade of shots which struck down Burkart.

The policemen admitted firing their pistols in the air in celebration of the New Year, but denied they had fired directly at either Burkart or Kim.

A post mortem examination to learn the caliber of gun from which the shot was fired that killed Burkart was ordered by the prosecutor.

HOWARD JONES IS HEAD OF COACHES

Los Angeles, (AP)—Howard Jones, coach of the University of Southern California football team, is the new president of the Pacific Coast and Rocky Mountain Association of Football Coaches.

Jones was selected to succeed Nils Price of the University of California. Eddie Klenholtz of Occidental, was elected vice-president to succeed Eugene Nixon of Pomona. E. L. Romney of Utah Aggies, was re-elected secretary and treasurer.

The 59 coaches who attended the meeting unanimously voted to recommend to the football rules committee that no changes be made in football rules this year.

Honolulu (AP)—Kunichi Yoshimoto, 32-year-old Japanese, was arrested here Tuesday, confessed author of an extortion plot directed against Mrs. Charles H. Wilcox, widow of one of Honolulu's wealthiest men.

Yoshimoto wrote two letters threatening "trouble," the first demanding \$1000, and the second \$3000, to be left with the cashier of a restaurant.

This was the second extortion case in two days, and police have attempted without success so far to link the two cases. An unknown person Monday unsuccessfully attempted to extort \$3500 from Uichi Yamane, Japanese capitalist.

Mrs. Wilcox, the second intended victim, is a sister of John Waterhouse, vice-president and general manager of Alexander and Baldwin, sugar factors, and of George Waterhouse, vice-president of Bishop and company, Ltd.

MUMMER MARCH IS POSTPONED

Philadelphia (AP)—The annual Mummers' parade, Philadelphia's gorgeous New Year's spectacle, was postponed Tuesday because of rain, until noon Saturday.

H. Hart McHugh, director of the pageant, said the costumes of some of the captains weighed 150 pounds when dry and that it would have been impossible to carry them when soaked with rain.

Members of the marching clubs put in much of their spare time during their year working on their costumes, spending hundreds of dollars on some of the capes, and they are opposed to wearing them in the rain.

THOUSANDS GO OVER TOLL-FREE BRIDGE
Portland, Ore. (AP)—As 1929 was ushered in, the Interstate bridge between here and Vancouver, Wash., was freed from tolls and greetings were exchanged by the mayors and chiefs of police of Portland and Vancouver in celebration of the abolition of tolls from the structure.

Tuesday thousands of residents of Portland and Vancouver were driving their machines across the bridge, receiving the thrill of being able to cross it without paying.

The action, however, does not remove revenue received from the franchise agreements with street car, power and telephone lines.

QUEEN MARY IS HOPEFUL SAYS NOTE TO MAYOR

London (AP)—A hopeful view of the illness of King George was taken by Queen Mary Tuesday in a New Year's letter to Sir Kynaston Sudd, Lord Mayor of London. In this letter she said:

"The king's illness must take its long, arduous course but please God, I may look forward to a lifting of the clouds and to a happy realization of the nation's faith and hope."

This hopeful expression by his majesty's faithful consort, who is visibly worn by the long weeks of anxiety and close attendance upon the monarch's sick chamber, followed by a bulletin from the medical attendants which recently have been indicating conquest of the king's actual disease and a centering of effort upon the upbuilding of his sadly depleted store of strength.

But there is still no indication of a state of extreme exhaustion—which medical pronouncements have dwelt upon so frequently—and this, it was understood, was a source of disappointment at the palace today.

The bulletin issued at 11:15 a. m., was typical. It read:

"The king has had a good night. The general and local conditions are unchanged."

This was signed by the regular doctors, Sir Stanley Hewitt, Lord Dawson of Penn and Sir Hugh Rigby.

Authoritative sources said today that while the king had not gone forward, he had not, on the other hand, lost any of the ground which he regained after last week's setback. The extreme weakness of the royal patient makes his progress slower than had been expected and this fact is causing concern.

The consultation of physicians this morning lasted about an hour and New Year's day brought a larger crowd than usual to the palace gates and the people eagerly read the brief announcement.

One of the early callers at the palace was the Prince of Wales. He remained there for some time.

The queen's letter to the lord mayor replied to the customary New Year's greeting of the latter to the king, a custom of long standing. After noting that Sir Kynaston's message came at a time of great anxiety, and uttering her prayer for a lifting of the clouds, Queen Mary concluded:

"The love and affection extended to me and my children throughout these dark days have indeed been a support to me and to those near and dear to me. When health and strength shall be, as we hope, vouchsafed again to the king, it will be a source of happiness to him to know that in his suffering he was ever in the thoughts of the citizens of London."

"I pray you, my lord mayor, to convey to one and all my heartfelt thanks."
