

FASTER TRAIN SERVICE PLEA IS DEFERRED

Woodburn—On account of the regular council meeting night coming on New Year's the meeting was not held until Thursday night of this week.

The matter of an ordinance allowing an increase in the speed of trains through the city, as requested by the E. P. company, was discussed both pro and con, but a decision was deferred until consultation with the city attorney could be had to determine the status of the state law in the matter.

On motion the city attorney was instructed to prepare a resolution of intention to improve North Sixth street in accordance with the plans and specifications now on file in the office of the city recorder. This improvement was petitioned for some months ago, but action was deferred until the beginning of another fiscal year on account of the funds for this purpose being exhausted.

E. N. Soule, water superintendent, requested that the city purchase a small concrete mixer for the purpose of mixing concrete for meter boxes at a cost of \$28 plus freight and this request was referred to the water board.

The unpaid water bill of a family in straightened circumstances was the subject of discussion. The father of the family was present and asked for the privilege of working for the city in payment of his bill. Street Commissioner Muir was ordered to give the man any work that he might have to apply on the payment of the bill.

The usual monthly bills were ordered paid and the council adjourned.

HINRICHS DIES OF HEART AFFLICTION

Albany—William Hinrichs, 77, a native of Germany and a resident of Albany for the past 28 years, died at his home here Thursday night following a sudden heart attack. Funeral services will probably be held Sunday at 1:30 o'clock, from the Fisher-Braden chapel with burial in the Masonic cemetery. The services at the grave will be in charge of the Albany Masonic lodge. He is survived by his widow, to whom he was married in Charles City, Iowa, in August, 1874 and five children. Mrs. Leah Freerkens of Albany is his only child living in Oregon.
