J. G. CRAWFORD LINN PIONEER, BURIED SUNDAY

Albany.—J. G. Crawford, 79, a resident of Linn county for the past 77 years, died at his home in Albany Friday night following a long illness. Funeral services were held Sunday afternoon from the Fort-miller funeral home, with Dr. D. V. Poling of Corvallis officiating. Burial was in the Riverside cemetery.

Crawford, at the age of 18, began his career as a photographer, during the 55 years which he followed the photographer's trade he had galleries in Eugene, Harrisburg, Lebanon and Portland, returning to Albany many years ago.

When a youth, Crawford became interested in ethnology, paleontology, geology and mineralogy. During his research in this work he discovered 75 mounds built by the ancient mound builders, who, according to his discoveries, inhabited the Willamette valley in ancient times.

In 1871 he was married to Miss Clara D. MacDonald, by whom he is survived and the following children: Bert Crawford of Albany; Mrs. Little Rader of Rainier; Harry Crawford, Salem; Gerald Crawford, Linton, and a sister, Miss Helen V. Crawford of Lebanon, and a brother, W. W. Crawford of Albany.

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ASSESSED FINE RECEIPTS GOOD FOR 'DRY' LAWS

Albany.—Fines going into the office of the district attorney in enforcement of the prohibition amendment in Linn county aggregated \$7,130 assessed and a total fines paid \$3,280 during 1925, according to the annual summary made in the Linn county district attorney's office. A total of 1971 days were spent in jail by prohibition violators, 87 complaints were filed and 84 arrests made.

Fifty violators pleaded guilty and four persons pleaded not guilty. Three trials were held, two violators being convicted and one acquitted. Two cases were appealed to the circuit court, one being dismissed, four were continued, one continued for trial, and one was transferred to juvenile court.

Fees taken in by the county clerk's office in Linn county in 1925 exceeded those of 1924 by a margin of \$832.00, figures for the past two years show. In 1924 fees taken in aggregated \$5,111.35, as compared with \$4,577.45 in 1925.
