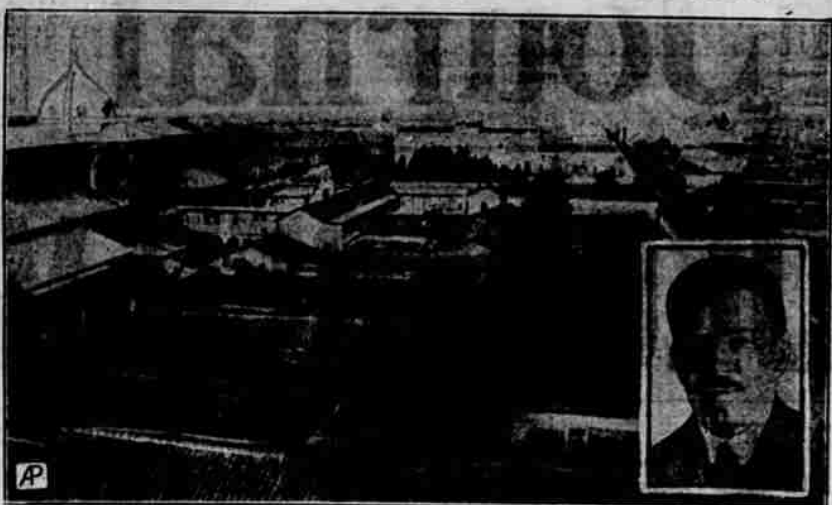
The dance given Saturday evening by Hugh and Leon Whitlock was well attended. Music was furnished by Herman Hohm on the accordion.
