BIRTHS MORE THAN DEATHS IN ALBANY

Albany—Births exceeded the total number of deaths in Albany in 1928, according to the report of the city health officers with 168 births and 139 deaths. Female went out in both the birth and death statistics, more girls having been born and fewer deaths among the females. Of the children born 95 were females and 73 were males. Ninety males and 42 females died.

During the past 12 months there were 118 cases of communicable diseases in Albany.
