

GOPLERUD WILL QUIT PRODUCTS PLANT MONDAY

Silverton—John Goplerud, who has been president of the Silverton Food Products company for the past five years, intends to resign his position at the annual stockholders meeting of this institution Monday.

Goplerud states that the canning industry in Silverton depends upon each individual in and near Silverton, all who are interested in the future of this city.

He states that many individuals seem to have looked over the difficulties of this concern and have passed out evil reports—have belittled its success and magnified its reverses that is hard to know just what next to do.

He says that the consumption of canned goods is increasing materially continuously. He says that having carefully studied conditions of growing fruits, vegetables and berries for the past years in this vicinity, he is not afraid to say that the soil, drainage, altitude, climate and other conditions necessary to further the luxuriant growth of these said articles, are all excellent.

Thousands of acres of stump land are waiting in the near hills to be cleared for the raising of strawberries, raspberries and all other kinds of berries and many varieties of fruits, according to Goplerud. This land is now inexpensive and with ones labor may be made to yield heavily. He says if \$500 an acre land can raise berries, why can't \$30 an acre land do the same?

He says to let Silverton and the surrounding community, that everyone must get behind this undertaking and make this canning a rising success, which can readily be done.

When he resigns Monday it will be with malice toward none and with a wish for a bigger and better up-to-date cannery for Silverton.

ALBANY PHYSICIAN SUED FOR \$75,000

Albany, Ore.—Dr. B. R. Wallace, of Albany was made the defendant in circuit court in Linn county in a \$75,000 damage suit filed by G. H. Peterson, Portland, Friday. Peterson, who is a former state traffic officer in this district alleges he received permanent injuries as the result of the defendant's treatment of his leg, which was fractured in an accident near Albany in December, 1922.

Peterson claims that Dr. Wallace was "reckless" in caring for his fracture and that as a result gangrene developed, causing him to have his leg amputated on February 26, 1923, causing him great physical pain and nervous shock and making him a cripple for life.

In his complaint Peterson alleges that Dr. Wallace set the fractured leg in a rigid plaster cast 30 minutes after the accident, not allowing proper circulation and not dis-infecting the injured member.

The plaintiff was hurt, December 22, 1922, when he attempted a turn on the highway on his motorcycle in front of a car. The accident occurred on the curve leading to the Murder creek underground crossing several miles north of Albany.
