

MARION FARMER EARLY PIONEER, RITES TUESDAY

Marion—I. N. Cook, 67, well known farmer of Marion, died at the farm home near here Friday night after an illness of nine weeks. Arthritis was given as the cause of death.

Cook was born in 1862 on the old Cook donation land claim near Turner. The family history dates far back into early Marion county history, the father, P. M. Cook, having crossed the plains and settled in Marion county in 1843 and the mother, then Mary Jane Edgar, having come with her family a year later.

I. N. Cook, at the time of his death, owned a part of the original Cook donation claim which was divided up a few years ago. At the time of death he owned three farms, the 80-acre home place, 120 acres of the old donation claim, and 60 acres of what was known as the Dave Edgar place.

Mrs. Cook, who died a few years ago, was born near Turner. Her maiden name was Alice Day.

Two children, Hugh Cook of Turner, and a daughter, Mrs. Ruth Cook Gentry, are the surviving children. Two brothers and two sisters also survive the deceased. They are Frank Cook of the Marion-Turner district, Tom Cook of Helix, Ore. A third sister, Mrs. Martha Ella Howe, passed away January 4.

Funeral services for Cook will be held from the Presbyterian church of Turner on Tuesday at 1:30 p. m. Interment will be in Twin Oaks cemetery at Turner.

CUTS IN MILLAGE FOR LINN TOWNS

Albany—Five of the eight large towns in Linn county will enjoy reduced millages in 1929, according to figures compiled by Grant Froman, county assessor. The five whose millages are lower are: Albany, Brownsville, Halsey, Harrisburg and Seio. The city and towns that will have increased millages are: Lebanon, Sodaville and Sweet Home.

Albany's millage will be 54.9 for 1929, the lowest for a number of years. Millages of the other seven are: Lebanon, 67.3; Brownsville, 70.8; Halsey, 41.6; Harrisburg, 64; Seio, 72; Sodaville, 47.6 and Sweet Home, 46.2.

Mrs. Stewart is also survived by four grandchildren, two boys and two girls, Veri Frederickson, Heppner, Ethel Chappin, Prineville, and Ray Carmack and Ed Carmack, both of Portland. Rev. L. H. Willard of the Evangelical church officiated at the funeral and the burial was held in the Odd Fellows cemetery of Independence.
