

ALLOW TRAINS FASTER SPEED THROUGH CITY

Woodburn—The Woodburn city council discussed the matter of allowing an increase in the speed of trains through the city from ten to 25 miles Tuesday night. City Attorney Blaine McCord gave the information that there was no general law on this subject nor any regulations by the public service commission and that cities may pass an ordinance relative to the matter as long as the ordinance is a reasonable one.

Mayor Broyles expressed the opinion that the speed limit should be raised and that ten miles an hour was too slow. Councilman Norman and Livsey seemed to be in favor of 20 miles an hour, while Councilmen Ezy and Beach and Mayor Broyles favored 25 miles. After some amiable discussion it was moved and carried that an ordinance be introduced changing the speed limit of trains from ten miles an hour to 25 miles an hour both in higher time and day and night. This ordinance will be prepared and introduced at the next meeting.

A resolution of intention to improve Sixth street from Harrison street to Fir street by grading and graveling an eight foot roadway was passed, the work to be done in accordance with plans and specifications on file in the office of the city recorder. The total cost of the improvement is estimated at \$540.00. An ordinance was passed assessing the cost of the improvement of Second street, from Harrison street to the city limits on the north, to the property benefited thereby. This ordinance carries an emergency clause, and became effective upon its passage.

W. J. Wilson requested permission to build a sidewalk abutting his property lower than the grade and this request was granted with the stipulation that the west end of the sidewalk, adjoining the Allen property be on the grade.

Leister Gilbert of the Economy Cleaning Parlors made application for a permit to build an addition at the back of his place of business, and after inspection of the plans which accompanied the application, which had been approved by the state fire marshal, he was given permission to construct the addition, which will be of tile with concrete floor.

In this connection the council wishes it to be understood that the building ordinance as it now exists is to be strictly enforced and no construction or additions to buildings will be allowed unless an application for a permit, together with the plans, is submitted to the city council for inspection.

A complaint was reported of the stoppage of the sewer in the neighborhood of Montgomery street and the recorder was ordered to purchase a self propelling sewer cleaner and root cutter for use in keeping the sewers in condition.

Street Commissioner John Muir reported that the city dump was now enclosed with a fence and the gate locked, and it was ordered by the council that no dumping be allowed without permission of the street commissioner, who carries a key to the gate.

Reports of city officers were approved and placed on file, some minor bills were allowed and the council adjourned at an early hour.
