

FORUM DINNER AT WOODBURN DRAWS CROWD

Woodburn—The Woodburn chamber of commerce banquet was attended by 125 people Wednesday night, among them many important guests from the legislative assembly in session in Salem. The dinner was held at the Bonhoff cafe, served by H. D. Bonhoff with Dr. Gerald B. Smith and Eugene Courtney assistants. H. P. Butterfield, president, presided.

History of the state traffic organization was outlined by T. A. Ratfey, chief state traffic officer, introduced by Keith Powell. Ray Van de Walker, state officer who patrols the territory between Salem and Aurora, told of the night patrol started last November. Four men are on duty in this district, their route including trips through the Woodburn business district, he said. L. M. Gilbert, superintendent of the boys' training school, was the speaker of the evening, having as his subject "Yellowship." Reports were given by Dr. Smith on the Christmas tree activities; Keith Powell on "Turkey day"; P. G. G. G. S. P. agent, pledged support to an effort to stop unnecessary whistling of trains in the city limits, while Ivan Beers reported merchants had contributed sufficient funds to keep the free Saturday movies in existence for nearly a year. Progress on the market road from Woodburn to Hubbard, paralleling the railroad, was reported by William Allemen.

Olson explained the proper method of handling the flag while Fred Evenden and W. G. Hardy were named the committee in charge of the February dinner. Woodburn—An epidemic of robbery seems to have struck Woodburn as well as Salem. On Tuesday night, while Mr. and Mrs. E. J. Hodge were entertaining a group of friends at bridge at their home on Corby street, a thief, with considerable nerve, entered the bedroom window just off of the living room where the party was in progress, with the lights on in all the rooms and left a trail of mud across one bed and a rug as he made his way to another bed where the wraps of the guests were ransacked. He secured a purse belonging to Mrs. R. H. Scott and after extracting \$15 from it, threw the purse on the lawn. As he left he carefully turned off the lights in the bedroom.

After the loss was discovered the marshal was notified but no clue was found other than footprints of a man in the mud. This is the third robbery in that neighborhood.

On the same night about 11 o'clock a thief whose tracks were the same entered the sleeping room of Mr. and Mrs. F. G. Havemann on Hayes street while the occupants were sleeping and took eight or ten dollars in one dollar bills from the purse of Mrs. Havemann which was hanging near the bed. He removed the screen to enter and very carefully replaced it as he left. Mrs. Havemann heard the noise as he was replacing the screen but Mr. Havemann assured her it was only a noise outside and of no consequence. The loss of the money was not discovered until noon Wednesday, although Mrs. Havemann was puzzled over muddy tracks in the bedroom but blamed that on her husband.
