VALLEY THEFT RING THOUGHT TO BE BROKEN

Stayton—With the arrest at Albany Thursday of three men, a series of robberies in the valley is believed to be solved. A fourth member of the gang is being sought. Merchandise stolen from the Gahlen and Associated Stores here January 7 was found in their possession and identified by John Gahlen, who with Harry Smith, city marshal and his son, North Smith, returned from Albany Thursday night. The men arrested are Frank Butler, 26; Clarence Backus, 33 and Sid Smith, 21. They were taken in a raid near Knox Butte. Butler is said to be the leader.

While the men deny robbing the Stayton store they admitted having been in the city two days previously, according to Marshal Smith. Two of the men were wearing sweaters identified by Gahlen as having been taken from his store while another was wearing trousers that also identified. The men had a touring car corresponding to the number of one that stopped in Sublimity three days before the robbery. Eugene Ditter, store owner, made a note of the number and said two of the men came into his store while the other two remained in the machine.

The trio are being held to the grand jury on a charge of operating a still. Seven hundred pounds of sugar and a 50-gallon still were seized in the raid. Hogs and chickens were kept on the place to dispose of the mash, the officers said. Robbery charges have not yet been filed against the men.

SLABY FUNERAL IS HELD AT MT. ANGEL

Mt. Angel—The funeral of James Slaby, 77 years of age, who died here Monday evening, was held Wednesday morning from St. Mary's church, with interment in Calvary cemetery.

Slaby was born September 28, 1851 in Austria. When he was 17 years of age he came to this country, settling on a farm at Cleveland, Ohio, where he stayed 13 years. From there he moved to Minnesota. In 1918 he moved to Okemne, Okla., where he stayed six years before coming to Mt. Angel.

He is survived by his widow and one son, Joseph Slaby, who with his family make their home here. Eight grandchildren and 10 great-grandchildren also survive him. Two daughters, Mary and Anne, died in infancy.
