

NAME OF PASS OVER CASCADE RANGE SOUGHT

Mill City.—With the probability of a new cross-state highway being built to connect with the present road at Detroit, there has been considerable discussion as to what name will be applied to the pass over which the road will be routed. Minto and Hogg are the names that have been under consideration, but according to a statement made here by E. Hennes, the pass should be named Hennes, inasmuch as he and his father were the first white people to travel over it.

He stated that, with his parents, he came over the plains in 1852 with an ox team, settling 2 1/2 miles below Mehamia. In 1864 they moved to what is now known as Kings Prairie, between here and Gates, settling on unsurveyed land.

On June 1, 1873, Mr. Hennes and his father, with packs on their backs, started for the Jefferson park country, reaching Marion lake on June 10, going on to the pass the following day, it being about four miles from the lake to the summit. He claims that they were the first white men to ever make the trip up to Santiam river.

That fall, John Minto went to the pass, and he was the first to point several miles east of Detroit where from a ridge he could see the bunch grass on Minto mountain, which he took to be grass in eastern Oregon. Mr. Minto, through his writing, prevailed upon the county court to appropriate funds to make a survey for a trail over the pass.

The survey started in June 1874 with Mr. Hennes as guide and was completed in 1879.

By virtue of their having been the first white people over the pass, Hennes claims the pass should be named for them.
