

MISSING SALEM GIRLS TAKEN BY LINN SHERIFF

Albany—Mrs. Lucile Jacobs, 20, Florence Hinkle, 18, and Helen Taylor, 14, all of Salem, were held in Albany Monday afternoon following their arrest by Sheriff Herbert Shelton for trying to cash a \$100 check they had stolen from Peter Minert of Crabtree Saturday night.

The three girls had run away from their homes in Salem and according to the story they told local authorities they were on their way to California when they met Amos Yokobetta, a friend who took them to Minert's home. At the Minert home they stole the check made out to cash.

Minert telephoned an Albany bank to have the check cancelled and when the girls tried to obtain the money this morning the sheriff was summoned, who placed them under arrest.

Late Monday afternoon their parents arrived to return them to their homes in Salem.

When Minert received the stolen check the charges were dropped against the girls.
