

SCHOOLING, EDUCATION, TOPIC OF P-T

Scio—"Schooling" and "education" may have entirely different meanings, according to opinions expressed in the course of discussions of the subject, "How much Schooling Should a Child Have?" at the January meeting of the Scio Parent-Teacher association in the high school auditorium.

Several speakers were heard during the evening, and all agreed that technical learning, whether in the name of schooling or education, is practically indispensable in successfully meeting the problems of life at the present time. One of the speakers declared that the farmer of today who knows nothing of the science or the chemicals of the soil is out of date; likewise he is handicapped in handling stock and poultry if he does not understand different strains, the results of method, system, proper proportions of growing and fattening feeds, etc. "Present-day business and industry more than ever demand education and experience, and the untrained man or woman today finds life for him more difficult than did the preceding generation," one of the speakers declared, and predicted that this condition would continue and become more intensified. All who spoke on the subject declared that the child should receive as much education and schooling as possible, and many urged that proper application of education had much to do with the success or failure of the educated person.

Encouraging increase in membership of the association was seen in the report of the secretary, and a representative of the membership committee urged each member to assist in enrolling new workers.

Rolla Shelton reported that his committee had been handicapped by the holidays, etc., but would soon install a new stove and a chimney in the gymnasium. The meeting voted to make settlement of \$10 for a stove purchased from Floyd Shelton some time ago. 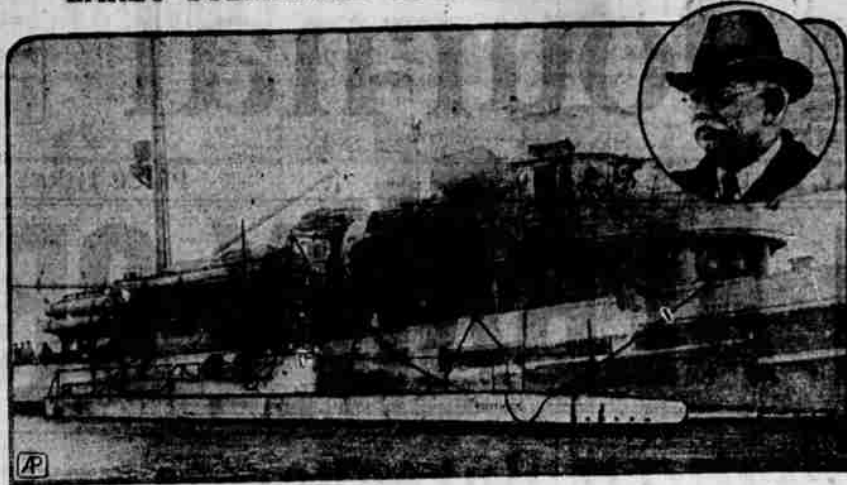
