

MERCHANTS ASKED TO TAKE SCRIPT OF CANNERY

PAPER GIVEN IN EXCHANGE OF PRODUCTS

Silverton.—The five members of the board of directors of the local cannery met with ex-manager Goplerud and many of Silverton's business men Thursday evening over the woolen mills store for the purpose of discussing and explaining the plan for issuance of script which will be given cannery stockholders in payment for delivered products which in turn can be used for the purpose of liquidating the standing obligations with merchants and which also can be used for buying general merchandise.

Under a normal year the amount of script issued should not exceed \$20,000 which will not entail a heavy burden upon merchants since the script will be issued from June until October.

Merchants will be requested to present all script received during the month to the cannery office on the first of the following month which same will be accepted and a trade acceptance issued to cover. In this way the merchant can cash his trade acceptance immediately by endorsing and presenting to the bank, or he can carry the acceptance and collect the interest.

J. Goplerud, who originated this plan, reviewed the past five years' program of the cannery showing therein where during this time there has been added the amount of \$15,000 for plant additions and machinery. Also the company has recalled \$8000 of improperly issued stock and the management has liquidated approximately \$11,000. This shows that the plant has made a net gain during the year of \$35,000.

The plant at present has outstanding a \$30,000 bond issue and stock on hand which is unsold of about the same amount.

This project plan of script was endorsed by all business men present at this meeting and will immediately be presented to all other business men as the board feels that this cannery should be greatly enlarged in its field of operation and that it can be made so, provided the business interests of the town ally themselves more closely with the cannery than they have in the past.

TOURIST CAMP IS HELD NEED OF SILVERTON

Silverton.—Attorney Alf O. Nelson, Earl Hartman and Rudd Benson, who were appointed a committee by the chamber of commerce to look carefully into the matter of a local tourist park, have issued the following:

"Silverton must have a tourist park this summer. What Silverton has lost during the last few years by not having one is hard to estimate. Many tourists have driven in to Silverton in the evening after a long hard day's drive and have stayed just long enough to learn that we did not have a place for the tourist to stop. They have driven away in disappointment. Their first and only impression of Silverton was that we are a bunch of deadbeats. Haven't even a tourist park. And that is their message to their friends and others with whom they come in contact along the trail. Most of these tourists are people of means and the greater the means the greater the disappointment and they hail from all walks of life.

"Prospective hotel and apartment men, farmers, factory men and people looking for various locations and investment but on account of this mistaken impression do not stop in Silverton long enough to learn what a wonderful opportunity there is here for a first-class hotel and apartment house, a mill condenser, a sanatorium, a hospital, cheese factory, a juice factory, the biggest cannery on the coast, a packing plant, another saw mill and a multitude of other industries which would do just as well here as anywhere on the coast. We are going to do our utmost to solve this problem about the park proposition, but in order to make any headway in this matter we must have the cooperation of everyone and any suggestion which will assist the committee and expedite the proposition will indeed be welcomed.

"Another institution which Silverton must absolutely have in the near future is a first-class combination hotel and apartment house. The proposed Cascade highway will mean very little to us without a hotel and tourist park. With them the city will fast become the metropolis of this section. Let no man who has the best interests of Silverton at heart be guilty of admitting that these propositions would not be worth while in Silverton."
