

TWO WOODBURN WOMEN BURIED THERE SUNDAY

Woodburn—Funeral services for Mrs. Martha G. Waterbury, who died at her home in Portland Friday morning, were held at the Methodist Episcopal church in Woodburn Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock. The service was presided over by the pastor, Rev. Aaron J. Neufeld and music was furnished by a quartet, consisting of Mrs. Perle L. Love, Mrs. Aaron P. Neufeld, James H. Lavesay and Sam Bergen, with Miss Wilma Morrison at the piano. The pall bearers were F. E. Morrison, Ivan Byers, Robert H. Scott, George Huber, G. McDougal, and R. L. Gulas. Interment was in Belle Pass cemetery where the concluding services were held.

Martha Comfort Schoeller was born in Chillicothe, Missouri, July 21, 1845 and died January 25 at the age of 83 years. She was the daughter of William and Mary Schoeller. When but five years of age she moved with her parents to Iowa. On June 16, 1876 she was married to George W. Waterbury who survived her. Mr. and Mrs. Waterbury celebrated their golden wedding in June 1926.

For the past four years Mrs. Waterbury had been an invalid following a paralytic stroke. She was a life long member of the Methodist Episcopal church and was an active member of the Woodburn church at the time the present building was erected, and has been a resident of Woodburn for 44 years.

The surviving children are Miss Carrie Waterbury, of Portland; and Bertha Wilson, of Woodburn; and William H. Waterbury, of Toledo. One son, John C. died in 1903 and a daughter, Anna, died in infancy. She also leaves eight grandchildren and one great grandchild.

Martha H. McKee was born in Canada, August 3, 1860, and while quite young she moved with her parents to New York and later to Michigan. She was married to David M. Gregory, December 17, 1877. The husband died last April. Two daughters were born to this union, Mrs. E. J. Tuttle of Warner, Mont., and Mrs. Iva B. Trudgen, of Broadacre, both of whom survive her. She died at her home in Woodburn January 25 at the age of 68 years. Early in life she became a Christian and has been an active member of the Church of God since 1895.

CREAMERY MEN KEEP LEADER; DINNER GIVEN

Monmouth—Stockholders and patrons of the Monmouth Co-operative creamery and their families held their second annual meeting in the Odd Fellows hall Saturday. There were nearly 250 people present at the meeting. The business forum was held in the morning when Frank Loughery was re-elected president of the creamery, while Ed Rogers and G. G. Hewitt were retained as directors, and Claude Holsington was placed as a director to succeed T. H. Gentle, who has retired as director. The creamery department has not produced as many pounds of butter last year as the previous year but the expenses have decreased accordingly.

Two cents a pound more was paid last year for butterfat than in the previous year, and the warehouse department, which handles the grain, has shown an increase in the amount of grain handled and there is also a larger carry over this year than the year previous, especially the wheat.

At noon a community dinner was furnished by the board of directors of the creamery and committees. In the afternoon a play "Neighbors" was presented by the dramatics department of the Oregon Normal school. Two songs by the Larkins quartet were presented and two songs by Merle Wilson. Mr. Tully, chief deputy to Mr. Mickel, the dairy and food commissioner of Oregon spoke and Dr. Jameson of the Oregon State college also addressed the group. James H. Gilbert, dean of the University of Oregon, was the main speaker of the day talking on farm problems in general. Ross Nelson, the owner of the Ross theater of Monmouth ran a special matinee for the children.

LOGGING WORK IS AGAIN OPENING UP

Stacyton—Mr. and Mrs. Claire Thomas were here visiting his parents last week.
