

DALLAS CONTINUES BATTLE FOR WATER SYSTEM

MOVE LAUNCHED TO MAKE GATES APPRAISE PLANT

Dallas—An amended complaint was filed Monday in the case of the City of Dallas against H. V. Gates, filed last July. Judge Brand was called in at the October term of court to sit at the hearing. Judge Walker having been disqualified.

This is an attempt by the City of Dallas to gain control of the water system. It was ruled by the judge that an amended complaint should be made by the city.

In 1902 an ordinance was passed making provisions for a water supply for Dallas. The city contracted with H. V. Gates to build the plant after the right of ways and sites had been secured. The city then gave him a lease for 20 years and \$10,000. At the end of 20 years the lease could be renewed for the period of five years at a time.

It was also provided that after the 20-year period the city should choose one man and Gates one man to appraise the value of the water system. Gates should then receive pay for the improvements minus the \$10,000 originally paid him. In 1927 notice was sent him but he refused to comply by appointing an appraiser. It is the intention of the city to buy the plant as provided by an ordinance passed at the time of giving the contract to Gates.

The estimated income from the Dallas water system per year is \$22,000. Gates contends that the city has no ready money to buy the plant and so he is not forced to comply with the agreement.

The city has attempted to vote bonds previously for the purchase of the water system, but has met with opposition. There is quite a bit of agitation for its purchase at this time and in case of a favorable decision by Judge Brand, another attempt will be made to vote them.

JEFFERSON DRIVER RAMS MOVING TRAIN

Jefferson—An accident which might have proved fatal occurred at the Southern Pacific depot at Jefferson Monday afternoon at 3 o'clock. An Oakland sedan driven by Ray Reeves, a farmer living near Talbot, collided with the north-bound Southern Pacific passenger train No. 18, at the crossing near the depot.

Reeves is somewhat deaf in his right ear but heard the train approaching but thought it was coming from the opposite direction, and as it was snowing quite hard, failed to see the train until he ran into the engine. The tender caught the front of the car, whirling it around off the track against the side of the platform which prevented it from over turning. While the car was badly damaged there was no glass broken and Reeves was not injured in the least.
