

WEBFOOTS-STATE PLAY FIRST GAME SATURDAY

RIDINGS MAY BE KEPT FROM FLOOR, BOILS

University of Oregon, Eugene — The first of a two-game series between the basketball teams of Oregon and Oregon State college will be played at Corvallis Saturday. Although on pre-season dope Oregon was expected to be one of the northern contenders, the Webfoot team has lost its first four conference games and there seems to be little hope that the team will finish in the first division.

There is a possibility that Gordon Ridings, leading conference scorer last year, will be out of the Oregon game. Ridings is suffering from boils and it is uncertain how long he will be out of the line-up. But Ridings is not the only Oregon player whose playing has been hampered by illness. Joe Bally, Scott Milligan and Mervin Chastain are in poor physical condition and have been unable to play through any of the games on the road. Bally was in the infirmary for three weeks before the opening of the conference season, with an attack of the flu; Milligan has water on the elbow, while Chastain has missed two weeks of practice and has played only a few minutes because of a sprained ankle and a wrenched shoulder.

Ray Edwards, Webfoot center, has been unable to get the jump on any of the opposing pivot men and that has discouraged him considerably. Ray is 6 foot tall, but all the other centers in the conference are 6 foot 2 inches and taller. McClary of Washington standing almost 6 feet 6 inches in his stocking feet.

Cochin Reinhart will give his lettermen a much-needed rest and will work on some of the players from last year's freshman team to see if any can replace the ailing veterans. After the Oregon State game, Oregon plays its remaining five conference contests on the home court.

Salem Quint Loses to Medford

LOW, BRITISH GOLF FATHER DEAD AT 60

London, (AP)—John Laing Low, famous British golfer and for many years recognized as an authority on the game, died Tuesday at Woking, aged 60.

Low was a member of the Royal and Ancient Golf Club of St. Andrews as well as several other golf clubs in Great Britain. He was president of the Oxford and Cambridge Golfing society of which he was captain for 20 years.

In 1903 he visited the United States as captain of the Oxford and Cambridge team which toured there. For several years he was chairman of the rules of golf committee, retiring in 1921 and it was in this capacity that he became an authority on the game.

Among the trophies which he won were the jubilee vase of the Royal and Ancient in 1897, the Calcutta cup in 1892, the George Glennie medal in 1900 and again in 1908 and the silver cross of St. Andrews in the same years.

TERRIS' FIGHT DAYS FINISHED

New York (AP)—To all intents and purposes, "finis" has been written to Sid Terris' fight career.

The "Ghetto Ghost," idol of New York Jewish fight fans, was knocked out by Babe Herman at the St. Nicholas arena Monday night. And with the heavy right hand punch that floored him, went all Terris' hopes of a successful come-back campaign. He may fight again, but not among the first-rank lightweights of the present day.

For five rounds Terris was able to avoid the wild, awkward right hand swings Herman threw his way. But after twenty-two seconds of fighting in the sixth round Herman connected flush with Terris' jaw and the New Yorker went down and out. It was his third knockout defeat in less than a year.

GIANTS SIGN ALL BUT EIGHT MEN

New York (AP)—All but eight of the names on the New York Giants' roster for the coming baseball season also appear on contracts but among the missing eight are two that may cause a bit of worry. They are Freddy Lindstrom, star third baseman who was runner up to Jim Bottomley for the national league's most-valuable-player award last fall, and Bill Terry, one of the outstanding first sackers of the circuit. The Giants' management, while insisting on the point that the holdout season still is far away, does not conceal the fact that it is more eager to see their signatures on contracts than they are to put them there.

Locals' Teamwork Badly Off Form; Two Goals Scored

Superior basketball, both on offense and defense enabled the Medford high school quintet to defeat Salem high on their own floor Monday by a score of 20 to 11. It was the second defeat of the locals this season, having lost to the Oregon State rooks two weeks ago at Corvallis.

Medford's quick forming defense was a serious obstacle to the red and black and they were able to score but two field goals during the contest, one by Bob Kelly from near the center of the floor during the first half and another by Gottfried, who knocked one in after he had replaced Beechler in center after the intermission.

Morgan, guard for Medford drew first blood when he spun one through the hoop after about three minutes of play. Morgan followed suit closely after and then Melvin, who gathered 10 points during the evening, dropped the ball through the hoop. Salem scored four times from the gift mark during the first period which ended 12 to 4 in favor of Medford.

Salem had few opportunities to score during the first half for whenever they got the ball within Medford's territory, the southern Oregon boys swarmed over them like bees with the result the locals did most of their shooting from awkward positions.

More fight was exhibited by the red and black during the second half but their efforts lacked coordination and the best they could do during the third period was three free throws. Medford did little better, however, gathering but five points. Both sides were off on their shooting during this period and the Peapickers missed time after time. Gottfried's field goal during the fourth period scored the only points gathered by either side. However, it was Medford's stalling tactics which kept the score down as they kept the ball out of play during the latter part of the game, having had instructions from their coach to slow the play.

A large crowd saw the contest with standing room being at a premium.

The red and black will go to Dallas Friday evening for a return engagement with the Polk county boys. The following Tuesday evening the Chemawa Indians will be encountered. Both games are district affairs.

YANKS TO WIN LEAGUE FLAG SAYS BARROW

New York (AP)—The New York Yankees will win the American League pennant again, according to Edward G. Barrow, secretary and general manager of the club.

Then in the next breath, he says "at Hans Wagner is the greatest baseball player of all time and the Chicago White Sox of 1919 the best team in history."

And then he names his all-time baseball team, leaving off Eddie Collins and Rube Waddell among others.

Having seen every American League team in action since the organization gained recognition in 1901 as a major league, Barrow is

qualified to make such nominations, but even so, many old timers and rabid fans undoubtedly will take exception to some of his opinions.

Barrow developed Hans Wagner and sold him to the Louisville club for \$2,100. He converted Babe Ruth from a southpaw pitcher to an outfielder. He managed the world champion Boston Red Sox of 1918. He was offered the presidency of the American league after Ban Johnson's regime ended but turned it down.

Barrow predicts the American league will end the coming season as follows:

1—New York; 2—Philadelphia; 3—St. Louis; 4—Detroit; 5—Cleveland; 6—Chicago; 7—Boston.

Fields did give McCarthy a boxing lesson and he is fairly fast, but the knockout punch which was said to be one of his assets did not materialize Monday night.

"Pop" Cheek, 104 Veteran Horse Trainer, Passes

Havana (AP)—A turf career extending over a period of 80 years has ended here with the death of Tom (Pop) Cheek, 104-year-old trainer. Cheek died of a heart ailment.

Shortly after he had seen his horse, Basha, an Also-Ran in the second race at Oriental park, he complained of a violent pain in his chest. Physicians said the trainer was suffering from heart trouble, but he refused to go to a hospital, preferring to go back to the stables with his horse. A few hours afterwards he dropped dead beside Basha, on which he had placed all his money in the afternoon.
