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COMMITTEE IS SPLIT ON RATE FIXING CHANGE

On the eve of the public hearing, slated for 8 o'clock Tuesday evening in the senate chamber, on Senator Joe Dunne's joint memorial requesting a congressional investigation of telephone rates and practices, members of the special commission appointed by the 1927 legislature to inquire into and report upon telephone rates and practices in Oregon indicate that the commission's recommendation that regulation of telephone operations in this state be taken out of the hands of the public utility commission and vested in the various cities will not be pressed.

While Attorney General Van Winkle, a member of the commission, is preparing a bill to carry out the recommendation other members of the commission said that it was unlikely that the bill would be presented as a committee proposal, and if it comes before the legislature for action at all it will be through introduction by an individual member. Members of the investigating committee make no secret of the fact that they are divided upon the advisability of trusting the regulation of phone rates and practices to cities indiscriminately, some of them pointing out that with the possible exception of Portland none of the cities are equipped to, or financially able to carry on the investigations necessary to the formulation of rate schedules.

Recognition of this division is contained in the bill being drafted by the attorney general which, it is understood, would make the transfer of telephone control optional with the cities. General supervision of rates and practices would remain with the state public service commission except in cities which by their own initiative undertake these functions. The bill is regarded in the high of enabling legislation to satisfy the demands of the people of Portland who recently voted to impose municipal regulation upon the telephone company there.

It is upon this question of direct popular regulation that the telephone lobby here has been directing most of its fire. Little attention has been paid to the Dunne memorial, which petitions congress to pass the

Johnson bill providing for a nationwide congressional investigation of the telephone monopoly and urges that Oregon be given recognition upon such a commission through appointment of a member of its congressional delegation.

Intimating that he is assured of sufficient support to secure adoption of the memorial by the senate, Senator Dunne said that his argument before the resolutions committee will be brief and confined chiefly to a statement of the findings of the state investigating commission revealing the need for a nationwide inquiry.

Members of the resolutions committee have been advised that the telephone company may make the hearing an occasion for answering some of the allegations made in the report of the investigating committee, but it is generally understood that they will not oppose adoption of the memorial other than to point out that the regulation of telephone rates and practices is a state matter and not properly subject to congressional inquiry or interference.

Mrs. Roque's arm was bruised but she did not suffer serious injury. DEPOSED KING IN EXILE STILL PAID HOMAGE

London. (UP)—Manoel, the ex-king of Portugal, observed his 39th birthday here recently. An unusually large number of callers came to the house in Twickenham near here to pay their respects to the former monarch.

Manoel was born in Lisbon on November 15, 1889. Although he was only Prince Infanta, the double tragedy of the death of his father, King Carlos, and the Crown Prince, Carlos died almost immediately, and the Crown Prince lived but a few hours.

The king was riding through the streets of Lisbon accompanied by Queen Amelia, the Crown Prince, and Prince Manoel when revolutionaries attacked the royal party. Carlos died almost immediately, and the Crown Prince lived but a few hours.

But Manoel had been on the throne but three years when another and this time successful revolution deposed him and sent him into exile. This was in 1908.

The royal exile traveled about Europe for two years finally settling down in London.

A small shadow court still pays homage to "the King,"—19 years after his dethronement.

Manoel and his wife, the former Princess Augusta Victoria of Hohenzollern, are prominent members of London's social world. The ex-king is a keen sportsman, specializing on golf, tennis and riding.

MRS. NEWTON DIES AT ROSEDALE HOME

Mrs. Mary Elizabeth Newton, 82, died Tuesday morning at her home in the Rosedale district on Route 3, south of Salem.

Born in White Lake, Mich., in 1847 Mary Elizabeth Clark grew to womanhood and was married to Charles Newton. They resided in White Lake until 1873 when they removed to Michigan, remaining until 1911, when they came to Oregon. They settled at Canby. Mrs. Newton died the following year.

Mrs. Newton went to make her home with her daughter and son-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Fred N. Cone at Rosedale. She was a member of the First Presbyterian church of Salem.

Surviving besides Mrs. Cone are a daughter, Mrs. H. H. Hart of White Plains, N. Y., and a son, John R. Newton, Kirkland, Wash.; 10 grandchildren and 14 great grandchildren.

INDIAN WHEAT FLOUR TESTED IN CALIFORNIA

Concoran, Calif. (UP)—Tests are being made by Kings county housewives of a new flour milled from "Pusa 4" wheat, produced on the experimental plots of the El Rico ranch in the Tulare lake basin near here.

The cereal was grown from seed brought from India and the experimental plots were conducted in connection with the agricultural extension service of the University of California.

The experiments have shown the wheat to be well adapted to local climatic and soil conditions and a considerable acreage probably will be seeded to the Oriental cereal next season.
